2010 State of the Village Address

Delivered by President Abruscato on January 26, 2011

In last year's address, I said that although these are tough times for the Village—tough times for everyone—I am optimistic about our future. While many challenges remain, I am happy to say that my optimism was justified. Despite the continued weakness in the economy, Wheeling is seeing clear signs of a gradual recovery.

By now you have all noticed the new construction at the Fresh Farms center. This redevelopment has been in the works for some time, and we are excited to see this key intersection beautified and modernized. You may also have seen improvements to the Walgreens store across the street; this location is one of the first to model a new look that they plan to roll out company-wide. An even more ambitious undertaking will soon be underway at our Walmart store, which will be expanded into a Super Walmart during the next year.

New businesses continue to arrive at a growing pace. In the past year we have welcomed new neighbors like Jet's Pizza, Krystyna's Market, Fannie May Candies, and Family Video, and we have seen vacated spaces quickly filled by others, such as Jimmy John's in the old Quizno's Subs location, Advanced Auto Parts at the former Blockbuster site, and a festive Mexican restaurant, Cinco de Mayo, where Arby's used to be. Although several businesses on Restaurant Row have closed over the past months, the former Claim Jumper, Don Roth's, and Le Francais sites are attracting a lot of attention from restaurant developers, as is the vacant parcel north of Tuscany. On a different and exciting note, the Village is honored to be the location of the Korean Cultural Center of Chicago, a major cultural and educational institution that will establish itself as the heart of the Korean-American community in Northern Illinois, one that will draw thousands of new visitors to Wheeling from around the region, the nation, and the world.

The Village has long envisioned the comprehensive redevelopment of our town center in the area around the Wheeling Metra Station, and since the Village acquired the Wickes property literally dozens of development groups have toured the site and presented their ideas. After a long and thorough evaluation process, we recently announced Urban R2 as our chosen developer, and they will now move forward with detailed planning. There will be numerous public meetings on this important project over the next year, and we invite the community to participate and offer input.

The Village also remains committed to supporting local manufacturers, and to bringing new industries to town. We promote Wheeling in national trade publications and actively engage with industrial brokerage groups to remind them of the benefits of locating here. Furthermore, I and other members of the Board of Trustees have been taking monthly tours of Wheeling manufacturing plants to find out more about the businesses and to hear directly what their needs are, and I've been pleased to learn personally about significant expansions planned by major industrial employers. I am also excited to announce the relocation of Protect-a-Bed to Wheeling, a business that will bring 100 workers to an over-200,000-square-foot facility.

The Village works in a number of creative ways to encourage business retention and smart new development—but the most important thing we do is simply to provide the basic services and infrastructure improvements that our residents and businesses rely on. In that respect, 2010 was also a very successful year. Using funds provided through the federal stimulus, we replaced the Hawthorne School footbridge with the new Sharon S. Ball Memorial Bridge, maintaining a safe link between neighborhoods north of Buffalo Creek and businesses and facilities on Dundee Road. We were also approved for an Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program grant to construct a bicycle / pedestrian path along Dundee Road between the river and the tollway. Last year, Village staff designed and managed asphalt resurfacing and drainage improvements on Industrial Drive, and installed a new manhole structure to improve drainage on Jackson Drive. We also continue to work closely with the Wheeling Park District and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District on the Lake Heritage / Levee 37 stormwater storage project.

The Village has undertaken a major initiative to replace and upgrade outdated municipal facilities in order to better serve the community. Last year saw the opening of our new Fire Department Headquarters on Milwaukee Avenue, and the renovation of the Police Department facility, along with the adjoining Fire Station 42, is nearly complete. These facilities will greatly improve our capacity to respond to emergencies and promote public safety. Our Information Technology Department has been hard at work maintaining the complex network that links all these facilities, and has successfully overhauled the Village website, which will see additional improvements in the coming year.

In times like these, we must constantly seek opportunities to do more—and better—with less. To serve the community more efficiently, the Department of Senior Citizen Services and the Police Department's Social Services Division have been merged into a new Human Services Department, and the Public Works Department has consolidated several of its core operations. Thanks to federal grants, eleven Village trucks were retrofitted to be more environmentally friendly, and light-emitting diodes were installed in 249 streetlights to conserve energy. Federal grants also funded the popular and successful congregate dining program at the Pavilion Senior Center.

Now more than ever it is important to work closely with other units of government and with the community at large to make Wheeling the best it can be. We've been lucky enough to enlist enthusiastic residents in such initiatives as the Bicycle and Pedestrian Task Force and the 2010 Census Complete Count Committee. The Village's many volunteer commissions continue to do excellent work, including the Human Relations Commission, which begins 2011 with a redefined mission and an exciting new focus. I've already mentioned our cooperation with the Park District on the Heritage Park project; we also continue to work closely with Wheeling High School on a variety of programs, as well as with the Wheeling / Prospect Heights Area Chamber of Commerce in various capacities, including the second annual "Dine Global Give Local" campaign (see the back page of this newsletter for details). The Village's most significant partnership, of course, is our joint ownership of Chicago Executive Airport with the City of Prospect Heights. We look forward to continuing the productive exchange we have had with Mayor Vole, the Prospect Heights City Council, and the Airport's Board of Directors as we maintain the airport's status as an economic engine for the region.

The Village of Wheeling has tried to view the economic difficulties of the past years as an opportunity to reassess, to streamline, to innovate, and to reflect upon our core services, operations, and values. I believe these efforts have made us better at what we do. I am happy to have more good things to say this year than I have minutes to say them, but I will close with this final thought: if all of us in the Wheeling community continue to pursue our goals in an atmosphere of cooperation and shared respect, and we each make an effort to do something every day that will inch us toward a better tomorrow, I am sure we will enjoy prosperity and success in the year to come.

Wheeling Community Blood Drive

The Village of Wheeling and the Wheeling Board of Health will be hosting a blood drive on Wednesday, March 9, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the Village Hall located at 2 Community Blvd.

Blood donors of all types are needed every day for critically ill patients, accident victims, people needing surgery and those patients suffering from chronic diseases such as cancer and leukemia.

You may not truly realize it when you make your donation, but the blood you give today will be there to help someone's life tomorrow. In turn, if you ever require blood transfusions some time in your life (and 50% of us will), it will be there for you because someone donated to save yours. If all eligible people would donate there would never be a blood shortage. Every pint of blood donated will help save three lives!

Prescription Medication Drop-Off

The Prescription Medication Drop-Off is held on the third Saturday of every month from 10 a.m. until 12 p.m. in front of the Police Station located at 1 Community Blvd. We accept prescription and over-the-counter medications in their original containers. We cannot accept any controlled substances such as Oxycontin and Percocet. We accept sharps (needles & syringes) in rigid containers with a sealed lid. We will not accept sharps that are not in a rigid container. Sharps containers are available through the Community Development Department, located at 2 Community Blvd. You can also get a new container when you drop off your full one.



POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

What to do when stopped by the Police

The most common reason that people are stopped while driving a motor vehicle is for violations of the Illinois Vehicle Code. These violations fall into two categories: moving and equipment violations. Other reasons you may be stopped include:

- Criminal investigations: you and/or your vehicle may match the description of a suspect in a crime.
- Courtesy or safety concerns: your trunk may be open, or something may be hanging from, or be on the top of your vehicle.



What you can expect and what you should do:

- A police officer may stop your vehicle at any time for a traffic offense or police investigation.
- Red & blue lights and/or a siren mean pull over to the right where it is safe and you will not block traffic.
- Remain in your vehicle unless the officer advises otherwise.
- If it is dark, the officer will use a bright spotlight and a flashlight to illuminate you and your vehicle.
- Do not immediately reach for your license or other documents until the officer requests them. Illinois State Law requires drivers to provide their license and proof of insurance upon request.
- Depending on the circumstances, officers may request identification from passengers.
- Remain in your vehicle, keep your hands where the officer can see them, and follow the instructions given by the officer.
- It is reasonable and legal for an officer to require that you and your passengers exit the vehicle, but do not do so until asked.
- Ask all passengers in your vehicle to remain calm and comply with the instructions given by the officer.
- Avoid being argumentative. Arguing will not change the decision of the officer. If you want to contest the violation, you will have the opportunity to contest the violation in a judiciary setting.

Each traffic stop is unique and the police officer must alter his/her response to fit the circumstance. Remember, if you receive a citation, accept it calmly. Accepting the citation is NOT an admission of guilt.

Generally, a police officer will:

- Provide his or her name upon request.
- When not in uniform, present proper identification. You may request to examine the credentials of the officer so that you are satisfied he/she is a law enforcement officer.
- Inform you of the reason(s) for being stopped.
- Only use force when necessary to effect the arrest of a suspect and to maintain custody of the suspect.
- Only arrest a person for a crime committed in the officer's presence, or when the officer has probable cause to believe the person has already committed a crime, is wanted on a warrant, or should be held for investigation of a crime.

Our Mission

The Mission of the Wheeling Police Department is to improve the quality of life for the citizens of the Village of Wheeling by the provision of highest quality of police services. The department will maintain respect for human rights, will promote integrity and courtesy, and work to build strong, effective police/community partnerships.

Do You Need a Permit?

Before you install, build or remodel new or existing structures within the Village, it is likely you will need to obtain a permit. Construction or installation of numerous items including fencing, concrete, roofing, building additions and new buildings require permits issued by the Community Development Department.

Protect homeowners' interests

The Building and Engineering divisions within Community Development are typically involved with construction projects including permit plan review, preliminary, and final inspection to assure all construction projects comply with current building and life-safety codes.

Obtain a permit before beginning the following projects:

- Alarm system
- Central air conditioning or furnace replacement
- Concrete stoop replacement
- Deck or gazebo
- Driveways, sidewalks and patios
- Electrical work
- Fence or dog run
- Fireplace
- Garage
- Home addition or remodel
- Lawn sprinkler system
- Plumbing work
- Roofing
- Satellite dish
- Screened porch
- Sewer repair
- Shed
- Siding
- Swimming pool or hot tub
- Water heater replacement
- Window or door replacement (if opening size will change)

Permits are issued at the Community Development Department. The forms are available on the Village website ([www.wheelingil.gov/reference desk/forms and permits](http://www.wheelingil.gov/reference%20desk/forms%20and%20permits)) and in our office. If you are unsure whether a permit is required for your home improvement project, please call us at 847.459.2620 with a brief description of the work, and Village staff will determine whether a permit is required.

The Community Development office is located in the Village Hall at 2 Community Blvd. Inspections on issued permits are available Monday - Friday from 7:15 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.

Reminder: Waste Management is the only waste hauler that is permitted in the Village. To schedule a dumpster for your project, please call 800.796.9696.

Annual Hydrant Flushing

The Village's Utility Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village during the months of April and May. During these months, hydrant flushing (weather permitting) will occur between the hours of 6 a.m. and 3 p.m. and will continue until all portions of the water distribution system are flushed. Signs will be posted while hydrant flushing is underway.

Flushing is an important preventative maintenance process and is undertaken to remove particulate matter and corrosion from the system. Residents may notice a slightly lower pressure and discoloration of their water throughout the duration of the program; however, the water will be completely safe to drink. Residents are advised to check the color of the water before beginning laundry to prevent any staining.

Capital Improvement Projects

The **Water Main Replacement Program** is scheduled to be begin in early May with substantial completion slated for September. Streets affected are: Beverly Drive, Woodland Drive, Pebble Drive and Wilshire Drive.

Starting this Spring through October 31 2011, Dundee Road will be reduced down to one lane in each direction during **IDOT's Dundee Road Bridge over Buffalo Creek** project. Call Tim Merrihew at 847.279.6911 with questions.

Yard Waste Collections

Yard waste, or landscape, collections will begin on April 1, 2011 and continue through November 30, 2011.



Single-family residents are reminded that yard waste must be placed in biodegradable 2-ply Kraft paper bags or in a container clearly marked with a red "X" around the body of the container. Bags and containers must not be larger than 33 gallons and must not exceed 45 lbs in weight. There is no limit to the number of bags or containers. Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected. Townhome units and condominiums are not provided with yard waste services. All bags and containers must be placed at the curb by 6 a.m. the day of scheduled collections, but not before 5 p.m. the evening before.

Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 45 lbs, not exceed 4 feet in length or 2 feet in diameter, nor contain limbs greater than 3 inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of bundles.

TIF District Façade and Building Improvement Grant Program

For businesses located within Village TIF (Tax Increment Financing) Districts, the Village offers grants to reimburse costs for exterior building improvements. The purpose of the TIF District Façade and Building Improvement Grant Program is to provide financial assistance for the design and construction of façade improvements which are in keeping with the Village Comprehensive Plan. The program is also intended to provide financial assistance for capital improvement projects completed in conjunction with a façade improvement project. Applicants may be the owner of an eligible building(s) or the owner of a new or existing retail business within the District. This program is a public/private partnership designed to provide incentives and assistance to encourage building improvements that preserve the character of the Village, and that help create a human scale and pedestrian-friendly atmosphere within the Village as well as address factors that qualified the District as a “conservation area.” If you are interested in receiving more information regarding the TIF District Façade and Building Improvement Grant Program please contact the Department of Economic Development at 847.459.2605.
