From the Desk of President Horcher

Another memorable summer is coming to an end, and this year's Rock 'n' Run the Runway was definitely among its highlights. With an observance of the Village's 125th anniversary, as well as musical entertainment provided by Wheeling High School alum Haley Reinhart with the Midnight Band, it was truly a remarkable event. Thanks to all who came out to celebrate with us, this was the best-attended Rock 'n' Run yet! We're also grateful to the local businesses who sponsored our event. Without your assistance we wouldn't be able to provide this unique celebration for our residents.

Development in Wheeling continues at a quick pace, particularly in the center of town. The 8,500-square-foot City Works Eatery & Pour House opened in August in the Wheeling Town Center. City Works offers 90 local and global varieties of craft beer on tap, and is located on the plaza adjacent to the future homes of the CMX movie theater and Mia's Cantina restaurant, both scheduled to open in the coming months. Other retail tenants in the project include AT&T, The Learning Center, Eggsperience, Meat & Potato Eatery, 312 Nails & Spa, and Inland Bank, as well as Starbucks, which opened earlier this year. The Village also continues to welcome new residents of ONE Wheeling Town Center apartments, who can now enjoy easy pedestrian access to the Metra station and the Wheeling Park District's facilities in Heritage Park, including the Aquatic Center and the newly-renovated Community Recreation Center.

Progress also continues on the \$90 million Uptown 500 mixed-use project, now under construction at the northwest corner of Dundee Road and Northgate Parkway. The project will ultimately contain 321 luxury apartment units and up to 12,500 square feet of retail space. The parking deck went up rapidly, and the residential portion of the project is also moving along at an impressive pace. Uptown 500 is situated between the existing 300-unit Northgate Crossing project and the 301-unit ONE Wheeling Town Center; these three projects together amount to an over \$250 million investment in the area around the Metra station. The Village continues to receive a variety of inquiries from developers regarding other sites in the center of town, and we look forward to the continued transformation.

In our industrial sector, Panattoni Development broke ground in June on a 162,000-square-foot speculative industrial building at Wolf Road and Dean Avenue, immediately west of the Chicago Executive Airport. The developer is targeting distribution, warehousing, logistics, and light manufacturing uses for the property. The project specifically meets the objectives of the Redevelopment Project Plan for the Southeast-II Tax Increment Financing District, and will provide additional property tax revenue and employment opportunities. Wheeling contains nearly 14 million square feet of industrial space with a vacancy rate of only 4.2 percent, and has the fifth-largest manufacturing employment concentration in the state. We're proud to continue adding to our thriving industrial base.

In closing, I'd like to invite you and your family to attend the next event in our year of anniversary celebrations: an all-you-can-eat Community Pancake Breakfast on September 28. The breakfast will be held at Fire Station #42, directly adjacent to the Police Station at 1 Community Boulevard. I look forward to seeing you there as we continue a year of honoring Wheeling's 125 years as a Village!

HUMAN SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Social Services Division

The Social Services Division offers many services to residents of the Village of Wheeling who need assistance, including assessment, case management, community linkage/information and referral, crisis intervention, court advocacy, short-term counseling, tangible and basic needs, victim services, and support groups.

The Social Services Division has professional social workers who work closely with the Police and Fire Departments as well as the schools and community agencies to serve residents of the Village of Wheeling. Medicare Open Enrollment

When's the Medicare Open Enrollment Period?

Every year, Medicare's open enrollment period is October 15 – December 7.

What's the Medicare Open Enrollment Period?

Medicare health and drug plans can make changes each year to cost, coverage, and what providers and pharmacies are in their networks. October 15 to December 7 is when all people with Medicare can change their health plans and prescription drug coverage for the following year to better meet their needs.



How do people know if they need to change plans?

People in a Medicare health or prescription drug plan should always review the materials their plans send them, like the Evidence of Coverage (EOC) and Annual Notice of Change (ANOC). If their plans are changing, they should make sure their plans will still meet their needs for the following year. If they're satisfied that their current plan will meet their needs for next year and it's still being offered, they don't need to do anything.

When can people get information about next year's Medicare plans?

Information for next year's plans will be available beginning in October.

Where can people find Medicare plan information or compare plans?

New plan information can be obtained by visiting www.medicare.gov, or by calling 1.800.MEDICARE or the Village of Wheeling Senior Services Division at 847.459.2670. Call for an appointment to find the best prescription drug plan for your individual needs for 2020. Appointments available during Open Enrollment on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m.–3p.m.

ALSO, join us on October 16 at 7 p.m. for an informational presentation on Medicare to learn everything you need to know to make educated decisions about your healthcare. SHIP-trained Human Services staff will walk participants through the steps to register for Medicare and also discuss what you need to know if you already have Medicare. This presentation is at Village Hall in the Scanlon Room, 2 Community Boulevard. Please call 847.459.2606 for more information and to reserve your seat.

Lunch at the Center (formerly Lunch at Pavilion)

It is finally happening: the congregate meal program will be joining all of the other wonderful programs for active adults at the Community Recreation Center!

Beginning in October 2019 (please call 847.459.2606 for specific transition date) Lunch at Pavilion will officially change its name to Lunch at the Center and will be offered in the brand new space at the Wheeling Park District Community Recreation Center (CRC). Village of Wheeling Senior Services hosts meal service for anyone 60 years and better. A nutritionally-balanced lunch is served MONDAY–FRIDAY from 11:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. Reservations are needed. Social activities and informational programs are included as part of this program. Each diner will receive written information regarding the cost of the meal and will have the opportunity to contribute to part or all of the cost. Daily deli and salad offerings have been added to the new menu. The suggested donation is \$5. For our frequent diners, we have available a five-meal punch card for a donation of \$20. These cards have no expiration date. Cards are available at the CRC in the Lunch at the Center room from 10 a.m.–2 p.m.

4 Lunch at the Center is committed to providing meals to all older/active adults 60 and better, regardless of ability to pay. Funds for this program are provided through an award from AgeOptions through the Federal Administration on Aging.

POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

Outside Burning Restrictions

With the arrival of fall, it's common for residents to begin the process of preparing their yards for winter. This often includes the collection of leaves, twigs, garden waste, and annual flowers for disposal. You may think the proper way to dispose of yard waste is by burning it, but in the Village of Wheeling that would be incorrect.

The open burning of garbage, refuse, litter, waste paper, cardboard, plastic, landscape waste, leaves, construction debris, treated lumber, pallets, flammable and/or combustible liquids, wet or damp wood, and/or unseasoned wood are prohibited by both the Village's Municipal Code and Village's Fire Code. Individuals in violation are subject to being issued citations and fines. Repeat offenders are subject to additional legal enforcement action by the Village.



Recreational fires using portable fireplaces at single-family homes and townhomes are permitted as long as they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, are not operated within 15 feet of any structures or combustible materials (sheds, fences, etc.), and only clean, seasoned, dry wood is used as the fuel source. Recreational fireplaces used near townhomes may be subject to additional restrictions based on their particular homeowners association. All recreational fires must be constantly attended and must have a fire extinguisher, a bucket of water, and/or a garden hose nearby. It is also important to remember to be a good neighbor and watch where the smoke is traveling. Work together with your neighbors so your fireplace smoke does not become a nuisance by blowing into their windows and doors. If your neighbor has respiratory health issues, please be respectful and don't use your fireplace until such time as the wind can carry the smoke away from your neighbor's home. Disputes between neighbors regarding portable fireplaces should be worked out between neighbors and not by calling the Fire Department or the Police Department unless there is a clear and present danger.

Bonfires are strictly prohibited except for public events and only with pre-approved Village permits and the Fire Department on standby.


Landscape waste should be placed in appropriate landscape waste bags or containers and placed at the curb for regular weekly pick-up by Waste Management. With proper disposal of landscape waste, the risk of fire within the community is greatly reduced, and it is healthier for all our residents to be able to breathe fresh air.

Uniform Do-Not-Resuscitate (DNR) Advance Directive: What you and your family need to know

As individuals reach the end of their lives as a result of aging or health-related issues, many individuals make a personal decision to pass in their home surrounded by family and loved ones. Sometimes hospice staff is present, but sometimes they are not. Other individuals choose to pass in a local nursing home, also surrounded by family and loved ones. In both cases, honoring the last wishes of a dying loved one is what is most important. But sometimes last wishes are not shared between family members, or last wishes have not been properly communicated to nursing home staff or other concerned parties. This unfortunately results in Wheeling Fire Department Paramedics being placed in an awkward position between family members and the dying loved one regarding lifesaving initiatives. Therefore, it is critical that the dying individual have a properly completed Uniform Do-Not-Resuscitate (DNR) Advance Directive – Physician Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST) form by their bedside to avoid such confusion.



A Uniform DNR Advance Directive POLST is usually completed at a much calmer moment, with input from all concerned. This document makes it clear what actions, if any, the dying individual wants to be taken should they become incapacitated and in need of life-sustaining interventions. If Paramedics are called to the individual's bedside and no completed DNR Advance Directive is present, the Paramedics are legally obligated to initiate life-sustaining measures and transport the individual to a nearby hospital, regardless of the verbal requests of family members. With a completed DNR Advance Directive POLST form, the Paramedics will confirm with a local hospital via radio that the individual has passed away, and then release the individual's body to the appropriate next of kin. With some careful planning, one's end of life can be made less stressful for all concerned, and personal last wishes can be honored with dignity. Guidelines for Leaf Disposal

Village Code 11.08.100 prohibits the deposit of leaves into streets, roads, or highways, and along the shoulder, curb, or edge of any street, road, or highway.

Leaves intentionally raked into such areas can result in clogged storm sewer drains and subsequent flooding.

The Village's contract with Waste Management provides an alternate, convenient method to dispose of leaves and other forms of yard waste for single-family residents.

In addition to two-ply Kraft biodegradable paper yard waste bags, residents may use rigid 32-gallon containers clearly marked with a red "X" around the container.

Containers and biodegradable bags, when filled, may not exceed 50 pounds in weight. There is no limit to the number of yard waste bags or containers allowed.

Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected.

Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 50 lbs., exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles allowed.

Loose or larger brush or logs will not be collected by Waste Management.

Yard waste collections conclude on November 30, 2019.



Storm Drain Grate / Inlet Cleaning

Storm drain grates/inlets help collect water and are normally located near the edges of streets or in yards. Grates/inlets blocked by leaves and other debris (eg. grass clippings, tree seeds, branches, etc.) do not allow for a continual water flow and may cause localized flooding. The Village encourages residents to check storm sewer grates / inlets near their property before, during, and after rain events unless a thunderstorm is occurring or there is concern for lightning. Do not stuff the debris into the grate / inlet or blow the debris into the street. If there is a larger concern, residents may contact the Public Works Department at 847.279.6900.

The Village encourages residents to help remove debris from storm sewer inlets.

Waste Management At Your Door Special Waste Collections

The Village recently approved a five-year agreement with Waste Management (WM) for the collection of refuse, recycling, and yard waste for residents, and of refuse and recycling for commercial establishments. Effective June 1, 2019 through May 31, 2020, non-senior single-family home rates will be \$22.23 per month and senior single-family home rates will be \$17.79 per month. To be eligible for the senior rate, please visit the Village's website at www.wheelingil.gov/431/Senior-Discount for requirements or contact 847.279.6900 for information.

The contract also includes a new program for curbside residents called At Your Door (AYD) Special Collection that is included in the monthly rates. The AYD program provides residents with an easy and convenient option to properly recycle household electronics and dispose of hazardous chemicals. The cost for the program is included in your monthly rate, and residents can utilize the program as many times during the year as necessary.

What materials are collected through the AYD Special Collection program?

Acceptable materials include, but may not be limited to, automotive products (antifreeze, batteries, brake fluid, motor oil & filters); garden chemicals (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, weed killers); paint products (paint, caulk, glue, stain, thinner, wood preservative); household cleaners (ammonia, cleaning products, rust remover, tile/shower and upholstery cleaners); items containing mercury (batteries, fluorescent lamp tubes, thermometers and thermostats); sharps (only if placed in sealed, rigid, puncture-resistant containers); and electronics (computers, monitors, keyboards, televisions, DVD/CD/VCR players, cell phones, printers, microwaves).

Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, tires, or any unlabeled or leaking materials will not be collected.

How do I schedule an AYD collection?

Call 1.800.449.7587, M-F from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.; or visit www.wmatyourdoor.com and submit a request form.

Please have the list of unwanted materials ready for their information.

What happens when I schedule a collection?

A collection kit will be sent via mail. The kit consists of a plastic bag, a bag tie, a survey card, labels, and an instruction sheet. Follow the directions for appropriate packaging and collection. If the materials for collection are not labeled, are leaking, or for some reason are not acceptable, a door hanger will be left with further instructions. When the package is ready for collection, place the package outdoors near the side door or by the garage on the specific designated collection date provided by WM. You do not need to be present during collections. Do not place the package near the curb or street.

How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond



Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

95% of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.



Almost 5% of households

will receive their census invitation when a census taker drops it off. In these areas, the majority of households may not receive mail at their home's physical location (like households that use PO boxes or areas recently affected by natural disaster).

Less than 1% of households will be counted in person by a census taker, instead of being invited to respond on their own. We do this in very remote areas like parts of northern Maine, remote Alaska, and in select American Indian areas that ask to be counted in person.

What to Expect in the Mail

When it's time to respond, most households will receive an invitation in the mail. Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Letter Invitation

Most areas are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking you to go online to complete the census questionnaire.

Letter Invitation & Paper Questionnaire

Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their invitation. The invitation will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

We plan on working with the Postal Service to stagger the delivery of these invitations over several days.
