

From the Desk of President Horcher

Another summer has nearly passed, and the coronavirus, unfortunately, remains with us. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I'd like to express the Village's pride in and admiration for the ongoing efforts of Wheeling residents, businesses, schools, and other organizations to work through unprecedented challenges and keep our community safe and strong.

We're particularly grateful to the Village's employees, who have remained hard at work throughout the pandemic to protect and support Wheeling. Although the Village Hall was briefly closed to the public in the early days of flattening the infection curve, our facilities are now functioning largely as normal, with added measures for sanitation and distancing. While we definitely encourage residents to make use of telephone and online options, as well as the drive-up billing dropbox at Village Hall, in order to minimize in-person contact, our employees are onsite and ready to assist. It's also important to note that homeowners and businesses that are planning renovations or other construction projects still need permits for those projects. The permitting process enables the Village to confirm that work has been done properly, and represents another way our staff helps keep Wheeling safe, even—or especially—during a pandemic.

Speaking of our staff, the Village recently welcomed two new members of its management team: Ross Klicker, the Director of Community Development, and Patrick Ainsworth, the Director of Economic Development. Ross oversees the Village's planning and zoning, business licensing, and public health functions, as well as much of our permitting and code enforcement; Patrick supervises the recruitment of new businesses and new development, as well as the retention of existing businesses. Both new directors arrive with substantial experience in their fields, and great enthusiasm for fostering Wheeling's growth in ways that serve the best interests of our residents.

And growth continues, even during economic turmoil caused by the pandemic. Residents have begun to move into the residential units at Uptown 500, the new mixed-use project under construction at the northwest corner of Dundee Road and Northgate Parkway. Wingspan Development has begun demolition of structures on the south side of Dundee east of Jack London Middle School to prepare for construction of its planned mixed-use project. Wieland Thermal Solutions has substantially finished the \$25 million, 110,000-square-foot expansion of its manufacturing facility on Northgate Parkway, and Panattoni Development's 163,000-square-foot speculative warehouse building on South Wolf Road is also largely complete. New businesses such as the Landing on Dundee assisted living facility and Wheeling Town Center restaurants like Mia's Cantina and Meat & Potato Urban Kitchen are drawing close to opening as this newsletter goes to press.

Needless to say, the conditions under which these businesses are opening is tremendously difficult and uncertain—which is why I'll close with another reminder that it benefits not only Wheeling businesses but all Wheeling residents when we shop, dine, and purchase services locally. Spending money is a practical necessity, of course, but it's also an expression of our values, and an investment in our future: a way to show our pride in Wheeling and to set ourselves on a prosperous path.

On behalf of the Village Board, I hope that this finds you and your family healthy and well!

November U.S. Presidential Election

Voter Registration – Available online and in-person

Cook County and the State of Illinois offer several options to register to vote for the November 3 Presidential Election. In-person voter registration is open until Tuesday, October 6. If you would like to register to vote in-person, please come to the Village Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. and bring two forms of identification. You may also register to vote online at ova.elections.il.gov until October 18. In-person grace period registration will begin October 7. To register during the grace period, you must visit an early-voting location and be prepared to vote immediately after registering. Grace period registration continues until Monday, November 2.

Early Voting

Early Voting will begin on Monday, October 19 and run through Monday, November 2. Voters do not need to provide an excuse or reason why they cannot make it to the polls on Election Day. A government-issued photo ID is not required but is helpful if there is a question about the voter's registration, address, or signature. The Wheeling Village Hall is not an early-voting site, but as early voting approaches, you can find the nearest sites by visiting www.cookcountyclerk.com.

Vote by Mail

Any registered suburban Cook County voter may apply for a mail ballot; it is not necessary to provide a reason. To obtain an absentee mail application, visit www.cookcountyclerk.com or call the Wheeling Clerk's office at 847.499.9082 to have one mailed to you. Once an application has been submitted to Cook County, a ballot will be mailed to your designated address. The last day to request a mail ballot is Thursday, October 29, and completed ballots must be postmarked by Tuesday, November 3. Please note that the U.S. Postal Service recommends requesting your mail ballot as soon as possible to account for any delays in the mail system.

Verifying Voter Registration & Polling Place

Board of Health Seeks Applicants

Join the Wheeling Board of Health to help promote the community's public health interests. The Board of Health can make recommendations to village authorities to advocate for public health programs and to preserve and improve public health. The Board coordinates three blood drives annually and it oversees pharmaceutical and sharps recycling collection programs. Members are appointed by the Village President and serve three-year terms. COVID-19 Testing

Anyone who would want to get tested for COVID-19, regardless of symptoms, can do so at any of the state's community-based testing sites at no cost. Testing is encouraged for individuals who have been involved in large gatherings. For a list of drive-through testing sites, visit: <http://dph.illinois.gov/testing>.

A drive-through testing site is available in Wheeling, sponsored by eTrueNorth and Walmart. Testing at this site is available by appointment for anyone who meets CDC and state or local guidelines for who should be tested, including healthcare workers, first responders, those with symptoms of COVID-19, and others in high-risk groups with or without symptoms. Fall Fire Safety Tips

The days are getting shorter and the leaves are changing colors – fall is on its way! With these changes also come the risks associated with seasonal hazards. By taking some simple precautions, you and your family can safely enjoy the season!

- Have your furnace or boiler professionally serviced. With proper maintenance your furnace is less likely to break down during the cold winter months, which can cause your home to catch fire or cause carbon monoxide (CO) to leak into your home. And it will probably save you money by running more efficiently!
- Give your smoke and CO detectors presents: new batteries! Smoke detectors increase the chances of you and your family escaping a fire in your home by more than 50%. CO is an odorless, tasteless, and invisible gas caused by the combustion of natural gas (in your furnace, boiler, stove, oven, etc.) and/or wood in your home. CO is the leading cause of accidental poisoning in the United States.
- Make sure to place CO and smoke detectors outside of each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- If your smoke detector is more than 10 years old—or you don't know how old it is—replace it. “Fall Back” daylight saving time is a great time to annually check on your smoke detectors.
- Clean your dryer's lint trap before and after every use. The build-up of lint can lead to a fire. Regularly remove lint from metal ducts and exhaust vents.
- You may be cooking indoors more now that grilling season is winding down. When cooking inside, never leave your stove unattended.
- In case of an emergency, make sure everyone in your home knows where the electric breaker box and water shut-off are, and how to turn them off.

Outside Burning Restrictions

With the arrival of fall, it's common for residents to begin the process of preparing their yards for winter. This often includes the collection of leaves, twigs, garden waste, and annual flowers for disposal. You may think the proper way to dispose of yard waste is by burning it, but in the Village of Wheeling that would be incorrect.

The open burning of garbage, refuse, litter, waste paper, cardboard, plastic, landscape waste, leaves, construction debris, treated lumber, pallets, flammable and/or combustible liquids, wet or damp wood, and/or unseasoned wood are prohibited by both the Village's Municipal Code and Fire Code. Violators are subject to citations and fines. Repeat offenders are subject to additional legal enforcement action by the Village.

Recreational fires using portable fireplaces at single-family homes and townhomes are permitted as long as they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, are not operated within 15 feet of any structures or combustible materials (sheds, fences, etc.), and use only clean, seasoned, dry wood as the fuel source. Recreational fireplaces used near townhomes may be subject to additional restrictions based on their particular homeowners association. All recreational fires must be constantly attended and must have a fire extinguisher, a bucket of water, and/or a garden hose nearby. It is also important to remember to be a good neighbor and watch where the smoke is traveling. Work together with your neighbors so your fireplace smoke does not become a nuisance by blowing into their windows and doors. If your neighbor has respiratory health issues, please be respectful and don't use your fireplace until such time as the wind can carry the smoke away from your neighbor's home. Disputes between neighbors regarding portable fireplaces should be worked out between neighbors and not by calling the Fire Department or the Police Department unless there is a clear and present danger.

Bonfires are strictly prohibited except for public events and only with pre-approved Village permits and the Fire Department on standby.



4 Landscape waste should be placed in appropriate landscape waste bags or containers and placed at the curb for regular weekly pick-up by Waste Management. With proper disposal of landscape waste, the risk of fire within the community is greatly reduced, and it is healthier for all our residents to be able to breathe fresh air.

Social Services Division

The Social Services Division offers many services to residents of the Village of Wheeling who need assistance, including:

Some social workers are currently working remotely but are able to virtually assist with your needs. Take advantage of the many services and great information available!

COVID-19 Assistance

These have been very challenging times. Although the COVID-19 pandemic may be lessening its grip on our community, there may be lasting effects for all of us. If you or someone you know is in need of resources to make it through this tough time, the Human Services Department is here to help. Our department has social workers available to provide information and referrals for whatever need you may have. Our staff has been working through the pandemic, providing services by phone and also video-conferencing when necessary. Some of the programs available for Village of Wheeling residents include:

- Wellness calls to homebound older adults. More than 150 residents are called on a weekly basis. Staff calls to check on these residents and offer a friendly voice and important information.
- Hot meals and frozen/reheatable meals for older adults are available on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Approximately 500 meals are distributed to older adults every week. Staff has also distributed more than 9,500 shelf-stable and frozen meals since March. If you or someone you know is a 60+ and could benefit from these meals, please call our office at 847.459.2606.
- Socialization while physically distancing for older adults is held from 9am–10am on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays before meal distribution. Come out to the west side of Village Hall with your mask, your chair, and your own coffee or tea and have a chat with your friends. Please call 847.459.2606 for more information and to register.

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


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

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Domestic Violence Awareness Month (DVAM) began as the “Day of Unity” held in October 1981 and conceived by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence. The intent was to connect advocates across the nation who were working to end violence against women and their children.



Domestic violence affects millions, both women and men, of every race, religion, culture, and status. It's not just punches and black eyes—it's yelling, humiliation, stalking, manipulation, coercion, threats, and isolation. It's stealing a paycheck, keeping tabs online, non-stop texting, constant use of the silent treatment, or calling someone stupid so often that they believe it. Since the Violence Against Women Act passed in 1994, we've come a long way. This landmark legislation combined new provisions that hold offenders accountable and provides programs and services for victims. Between 1993 and 2010, the overall rate of domestic violence dropped by nearly two-thirds, and state level reforms have addressed issues such as dating abuse in the workplace, stalking, employment discrimination, and more. Nearly three out of four Americans personally know someone who is or has been a victim of domestic violence. Now is time to take a stand. Support survivors and speak out against domestic violence all month long.

Medicare Open Enrollment

When's the Medicare Open Enrollment Period?

Every year, Medicare's open enrollment period is October 15 – December 7.

What's the Medicare Open Enrollment Period?

Medicare health and drug plans can make changes each year to cost, coverage, and what providers and pharmacies are in their networks. October 15 to December 7 is when all people with Medicare can change their health plans and prescription drug coverage for the following year to better meet their needs.

How do people know if they need to change plans?

People in a Medicare health or prescription drug plan should always review the materials their plans send them, like the Evidence of Coverage (EOC) and Annual Notice of Change (ANOC). If their plans are changing, they should make sure their plans will still meet their needs for the following year. If they're satisfied that their current plan will meet their needs for next year and it's still being offered, they don't need to do anything.

When can people get information about next year's Medicare plans?

Information for next year's plans will be available beginning in October.

Where can people find Medicare plan information or compare plans?

New plan information can be obtained by visiting www.medicare.gov, or by calling 1.800.MEDICARE or the Village of Wheeling Senior Services Division at 847.459.2670. Call for an appointment to find the best prescription drug plan for your individual needs for 2021. Appointments are available during open enrollment on Mondays and Thursdays from 9 a.m.–3p.m.

ALSO, join us on October 15 at 7 p.m. for a virtual informational presentation on Medicare to learn everything you need to know to make educated decisions about your healthcare. Call to register and receive the link for the presentation. Trained Human Services staff will walk participants through the steps to register for Medicare and also discuss what you need to know if you already have Medicare. Guidelines for Leaf Disposal

Village Code 11.08.100 prohibits the deposit of leaves into streets, roads, or highways, and along the shoulder, curb, or edge of any street, road, or highway.

Leaves intentionally raked into such areas can result in clogged storm sewer drains and subsequent flooding.

The Village's contract with Waste Management provides an alternate, convenient method to dispose of leaves and other forms of yard waste for residents of single-family homes.

In addition to two-ply Kraft biodegradable paper yard waste bags, residents may use rigid 32-gallon containers clearly marked with a red "X" around the container.

Containers and biodegradable bags, when filled, may not exceed 50 pounds in weight. There is no limit to the number of yard waste bags or containers allowed.

Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected.

Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 50 lbs., exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles allowed.

Loose or larger brush or logs will not be collected by Waste Management.

Yard waste collections conclude on November 30, 2020.

Waste Management At Your Door Special Waste Collections

Residents with curbside collection can properly dispose of and recycle home-generated special materials safely, easily, and responsibly. The cost for the program is included in monthly rates, and curbside residents can utilize the program as many times during the year as necessary. Below is information on the At Your Door (AYD) service.

What materials are collected through the AYD program?

Acceptable materials include, but may not be limited to, automotive products (antifreeze, batteries, brake fluid, motor oil, and filters); garden chemicals (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, weed killers); paint products (paint, caulk, glue, stain, thinner, wood preservative); household cleaners (ammonia, cleaning products, rust remover, tile/shower, and upholstery cleaners); items containing mercury (batteries, fluorescent lamp tubes, thermometers, and thermostats); sharps (only if placed in sealed, rigid, puncture-resistant containers); and electronics (computers, monitors, keyboards, televisions, DVD/CD/VCR players, cell phones, printers, fax machines, microwaves).

Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, tires, or any unlabeled or leaking materials will not be collected.

How do I schedule an AYD collection?

Curbside residents must contact WM in one of two ways, and should have the list of unwanted materials available for their information.

- Call (800) 449-7587 CST, M-F from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Go to www.wmatyourdoor.com and complete a request form

What happens when I schedule a collection?

A collection kit will be sent via mail based on the item(s) being disposed. Residents must follow the directions in the collection kit for appropriate packaging and collection. If the materials for collection are unlabeled, leaking, or for some reason not acceptable, a door hanger will be left with further instructions.

When the package is ready for collection, place the package outdoors, near the side door, or by the garage, on the specific designated collection date provided by Waste Management. Do not place the package near the curb or street. Residents do not need to be present during collections.

Storm Drain Grate/Inlet Cleaning

Storm drain grates/inlets are normally located near the edge of streets or in rear yards, collecting water which uses the storm sewer system to ultimately flow into streams, rivers, or lakes. Grates/inlets obstructed with leaves and other debris can deny constant water flow and can cause localized flooding. As leaves begin to fall, the Village encourages residents to safely clear storm sewer grates/inlets near their property to avoid local flooding issues. If a grate/inlet is obstructed, rake the debris off of the structure and onto the parkway or into a waste container. If ponding or another concern arises, contact Public Works 847.279.6900.

Census Takers in Your Neighborhood

Census takers have begun visiting homes that haven't yet responded to the 2020 Census.

What To Expect

Census takers will wear masks and follow local public health guidelines when they visit your home. All census takers complete a virtual COVID-19 training on social distancing and other health and safety protocols before beginning their work in neighborhoods.



Census takers are hired from your area, and their goal is to help you and everyone in your home be counted in the 2020 Census. If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language.

If no one is home when the census taker visits, the census taker will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online at 2020census.gov, by phone by calling 844.330.2020, or by mail by returning the paper questionnaire sent to your home.

If you respond online or by phone today, a census taker is less likely to have to visit your home to collect your response.

How Can You Verify That Someone Is a Census Taker?

If someone visits your home this year to collect information for the 2020 Census, check to make sure they have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date. Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.



A census taker may carry a laptop, laptop bag, confidentiality notices, and an "Official Business" notice for their vehicle. Census takers may also deliver a paper questionnaire by hanging it on the front door in a water-resistant plastic bag.



If you still have questions about their identity, you can contact your regional census center by calling 312.579.1500 to speak with a Census Bureau representative.

Halloween Safety

Although traditional trick-or-treating will look different this year due to distancing concerns with COVID-19, the Village still anticipates having regular trick-or-treat hours, which run from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. on October 31. While we all work towards determining a prudent avenue for trick-or-treating this year, please consider these safety measures.



- If you will be welcoming trick-or-treaters to your home, please be sure to turn on your front porch lights
- Consider ways for contact-less candy distribution
- Incorporate a facial covering or mask into costumes to help prevent the spread of germs
- Only eat unopened candies and treats that are in original wrappers.
- Check out all treats at home in a well-lit area
- Do not enter any houses
- Make sure costumes are flame-retardant
- Keep costumes short to prevent falls
- Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes for visibility
- Young trick-or-treaters should always be accompanied by an adult
- Older trick-or-treaters should stay in groups
- Try to trick-or-treat while it's still light out
- Respect others and their property

Village of Wheeling offices will be closed Monday, September 7 for Labor Day.

All Waste Management refuse, recycling, and yard waste pick-ups will be delayed by one day.
