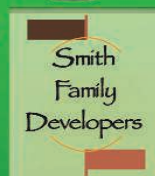

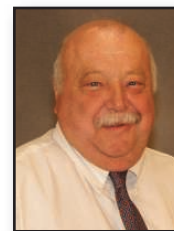

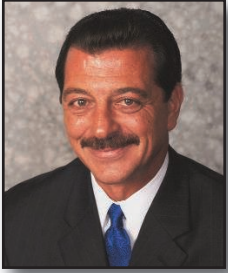

From the Desk of President Argiris

In the last newsletter, I told you about exciting new developments that will help transform the Dundee Road corridor into a dynamic downtown if they are allowed to move forward. These developments rely on Tax Increment Financing (TIF), a proven economic development tool, to make them a reality. This is something I want Wheeling residents to get excited about, so it's been great to see the flurry of news coverage about the two new TIF districts that the Village is establishing. I'd like to give you more information about TIF, and to clarify some of the points discussed in those news reports.

•Economic development is the lifeblood of Wheeling. Our community is blessed with many advantages. We have a wonderful location in the metropolitan area, with many shopping, transportation, and restaurant options, as well as great housing stock and hard-working people. But like every similar suburban town, Wheeling needs to grow. If we are not growing, we are declining—especially in an economy that remains weak. I recently learned a startling fact: nearly eight times more retail space was developed in the metro area in 2006 than in 2013, which means it's now far more difficult for communities to attract development. Quality development brings obvious advantages, including not only new shopping, entertainment, and housing amenities, but also new tax revenue that helps the Village and other taxing districts pay for vital services while keeping taxes as low as possible. That is exactly the game plan with these new TIF districts.

•TIF districts have helped Wheeling grow. At the June 2 Village Board meeting I made a presentation that showed how TIF has been successful in Wheeling. Considered together, our TIF districts helped bring \$44 million in value to the tax rolls—and much or all of that new development wouldn't have happened without TIF. Keep in mind that Wheeling is far from



Rendering of future Town Center site on the vacant former Wickes property on Dundee Rd.

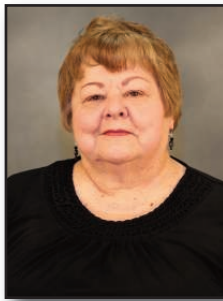
unique in putting TIF to work as an economic development tool: TIFs are common in municipalities all over Illinois and in many other states. When used responsibly, like they have been in Wheeling, TIFs help improve the quality of life for all our residents.

•TIF is strictly regulated in Wheeling. Our creation of the two new TIFs has not come without controversy. Representatives from the schools and other taxing districts have suggested that the Village is trying to get around Illinois TIF laws by creating new districts in the same location as previous districts. The Village takes these concerns very seriously, and would never proceed on a path that conflicts with the law. Our team of experts has carefully researched this issue and advised us that our new TIF districts are proper, ethical, and entirely consistent with legal requirements. Simply put, the law allows TIF to be used in areas where conditions show that it is needed—which is clearly the case in our two new districts. The Village is the only governmental entity with the statutory tools to promote economic development: it's our role under the law, and also our responsibility. We are disappointed that the other taxing districts have indicated that they may challenge our new TIFs in court. Although they certainly have a right to do so, we think this course of action would be terribly unproductive and damaging, potentially derailing upcoming development to no one's benefit. I believe our residents want us to work together to better our community, not to waste taxpayer dollars in litigation while key areas continue to deteriorate from neglect. I hope we can avoid that outcome.

•Economic development is a team effort. Attracting quality development while keeping existing businesses is a top priority for the Village—the key to future prosperity for our community. A healthy, prosperous Wheeling helps the other taxing districts within our boundaries prosper, too. Without new development, the schools, parks, and library will strain to provide the services that Wheeling residents rely on. We are all part of the same quilt; we prosper or decline together. Despite our differences on this current issue, the Village works closely with all the taxing districts, and will continue to do so in the future.

POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

Are you Familiar with the Illinois Hands-Free Phone Law?

You probably already know that beginning on January 1, 2014, Illinois banned the use of all hand-held devices while driving; drivers may only use hands-free technology such as speakerphones, Bluetooth, and earpieces. But do you know the rules for school and construction zones, new drivers, and texting?

•**School Zones:** All cell phone use is prohibited while driving in a school zone, including hands-free technology.

•**Construction Zones:** All cell phone use is prohibited while driving in a highway construction zone, including hands-free technology.

•**New Drivers:** Drivers 18 years of age and younger are prohibited from using wireless phones while driving, with or without hands-free technology.

•**Bus Drivers and Truck Drivers:** Bus and truck drivers are prohibited from texting and any cell phone use while driving.



Anti-Texting Law

All drivers in Illinois are prohibited from texting while driving. Illinois' anti-texting law (625 ILCS 5/12-610.2) states that "A person may not operate a motor vehicle on a roadway while using an electronic communication device to compose, send, or read an electronic message." An "electronic communication device" refers to a wireless telephone, personal digital assistant, or portable or mobile computer that's used for composing, reading, or sending an electronic message. It doesn't include a GPS or navigation system or a device that is physically or electronically integrated into the motor vehicle. An electronic message refers to electronic mail, a text message, an instant message, or a command or request to access an Internet site.

Exceptions: There are exceptions for drivers who are 1) texting for the sole purpose of reporting an emergency situation and continue communication with emergency personnel during the emergency situation; 2) using a device in hands-free or voice-activated mode; 3) parked on the shoulder of a roadway; or 4) stopped due to normal traffic being obstructed, with their motor vehicle transmission in park.

Penalties: A first offense is considered an equipment violation that does not affect your driving record. Subsequent violations are considered moving violations and will affect your driving record. Illinois's cell phone and texting laws are considered "primary" laws. A primary law means that an officer can pull you over for the offense without having to witness some other violation; if an officer sees you texting, you can be stopped and issued a citation.

Village of Wheeling 2013 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013

The Annual Water Quality Report, also known as the Consumer Confidence Report, is an annual report required by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). This report is intended to provide citizens with important information about the Village's drinking water and the efforts made by the water system to provide safe drinking water. The report provides facts, violations (if applicable) and contaminants identified in the water drinking supply during the calendar year of January 1–December 31, 2013.

The Village of Wheeling is committed to providing all consumers with safe and reliable drinking water. The Village of Wheeling is happy to announce that no violations were recorded for 2013 regarding monitoring, reporting, treatment technique, maximum residual disinfectant level, or maximum contaminant level. SOURCE OF WATER AND DISTRIBUTION

The source of drinking water used by the Village of Wheeling is Purchased Surface Water. Wheeling receives water from Lake Michigan through the Northwest Water Commission (NWWC), which in turn receives water from the City of Evanston that utilizes three water cribs, or intakes, located over a mile offshore in Lake Michigan. Evanston pumps and treats the lake water at their treatment plant. The plant provides the following treatment processes: coagulation/flocculation, sedimentation, filtration, and disinfection. The water is then transported to the NWWC through a 60-inch transmission main to a 25 million gallon reservoir at the NWWC main pumping station. From there, water is pumped into the Village's three receiving stations.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800.426.4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as those with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their healthcare providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800.426.4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and radioactive materials, and can pick up substances that result from the presence of animals or human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which can come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife;
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming;
- Pesticides and herbicides from a variety of sources, such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses;
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems;
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring, or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, USEPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protections for public health.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENTS

The Village of Wheeling wants customers to be informed about their water quality. The public is welcome to attend Village Board meetings where decisions that affect drinking water quality are made. The Village Board meets every first and third Monday of the month at 6:30 PM at Village Hall, 2 Community Boulevard, Wheeling, IL 60090. The source water assessment for the Village's supply has been completed by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA). The Illinois EPA considers all surface-water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface-water allows contaminants to migrate into the intakes with no protection, only dilution, which is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. All three of Evanston's intakes are located far enough offshore that shoreline impacts are not considered a factor on water quality. However, at certain times of the year the potential for contamination exists due to the proximity of the North Shore Channel and wet-weather flows. In addition, the proximity to a major shipping lane adds to the susceptibility of these three intakes.

DEFINITIONS & ABBREVIATIONS:

- **Action Level (AL):** The concentration of a contaminant that triggers treatment or other actions by the water supply.
- **Avg:** Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.
- **Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL):** The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- **Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG):** The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- **Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL):** The highest level of a drinking water disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- **Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG):** The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of disinfectants used to control microbial contaminants.
- **mrem/year:** Millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body).
- **NA:** Not applicable.
- **NTU:** Nephelometric turbidity units.
- **pCi/L:** Picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity).
- **ppb:** Parts per billion, or micrograms per liter.
- **ppm:** Parts per million, or milligrams per liter.
- **Treatment Technique (TT):** A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Water Meter Replacement Program

In 2013, Wheeling implemented a Village-wide water meter upgrade program to replace existing meters and remote readers with a new Fixed Base Automatic Meter Reading System in all residential, commercial, and industrial areas. The new system improves service to all customers by providing more efficient monitoring of water consumption as well as other customer service enhancements.

On January 4, 2011, the Reduction of Lead in Drinking Water Act was passed, amending the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). The legislation amends the SDWA and mandates the wetted surfaces of products in contact with drinking water to have a 0.25% maximum lead content, effective on January 4, 2014. The Village's new water meters comply with this new legislation.

Water Restriction Reminder

As part of preserving our water resource, the Village reminds consumers that non-essential use of water is prohibited every day from May 15th to September 15th between the hours of 12:00 pm and 6:00 pm. Types of non-essential use include, but are not limited to, lawn irrigation, washing vehicles, using hoses for clean-up, and washing/pressure-washing streets, sidewalks, parking lots, paved areas, and building exteriors.

Summer Property Maintenance

Community Development property maintenance staff will be out in force this summer ensuring that properties in our community are observing the following property maintenance requirements:

- Maintain grass and weeds (maximum height eight inches).
- Maintain shrubs and trees including removal or pruning of dead, overgrown, or improperly maintained plants.
- Keep building exterior free of cracking and peeling paint.
- Keep fences, sheds, and other accessory structures in good repair.
- Stow garbage cans in the garage or adjacent to the house in a side or rear yard between pick-up days.

If you notice ill-kept properties in your neighborhood, please contact Community Development at 847.459.2620 so that our staff can investigate the status of the properties and take steps to re-establish maintenance.

Waste Management Contract

The Village of Wheeling has approved a second five-year extension contract with Waste Management for the collection of refuse, recycling, and yard waste. Effective June 1, 2014, there was a reduction in rates. For one collection per week, single family (detached) rates will be \$19.93 per month, townhome rates will be \$15.53 per month, and senior rates will be \$14.95 per month. Multi-family units and commercial establishments will also receive a rate reduction based on container size and number of collections.

Rain Barrels Available

Rain barrels are containers that collect and store rainwater from rooftops via downspout that would otherwise be lost to runoff and diverted to storm drains, creeks, and rivers. Because it does not contain minerals, chlorine, fluoride, or other chemicals, the stored rainwater in barrels provides a supply of water that is ideal for gardens, potted plants/flowers, lawns, and even bicycle and car washing. Rain barrels reduce stormwater pollution and conserve water.



The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) now offers rain barrels to residents year-round through their Rain Barrel Program at a cost of \$58 each plus tax. The price includes an installation kit and home delivery for residents living in the MWRD's service area. There is a limit of two rain barrels per household. Please keep rain barrels along the side or rear of lots, and hidden or camouflaged (behind bushes, etc.) if possible.

Protect your Home Against Mosquitoes

Mosquitoes can develop in water that has been stagnant for more than five days. They can breed in a small amount of water the size of a bottle cap. Please follow these tips to reduce the mosquito population and prevent the spread of West Nile Virus:

- Remove old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or other containers that can hold water from your front and back yards. Play tires should have holes drilled through them to prevent water from accumulating.
- Empty plastic wading pools weekly or store upside down.
- Do not allow water to collect in pool covers.
- Do not allow swimming pools or hot tubs to be neglected.
- Stock ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish such as goldfish or minnows.
- Store boats, garden equipment, and toys covered or upside down.
- Empty and refill water bowls for pets daily.
- Change bird bath and plant saucer water every few days.
- Keep weeds and grass cut short.
- Keep home screens in good repair and tight-fitting.
- Keep gutters free of debris and in good repair.
- Repair leaky outside faucets.

Protect Yourself and Your Family

- If you are going out between dusk and dawn, remember to wear long sleeves, pants, socks, and shoes.
- Apply insect repellent with DEET, picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus according to the labeled instructions.

Report Dead Birds

If you find a dead bird and the carcass doesn't have any outward signs of trauma, call Health Officer Beverly Slaby at 847.499.9045. Birds that have an odor, maggots, deflated eyes, or visible wounds will not be accepted for testing; double-bag these birds and discard them in the trash. If the bird is acceptable, it will be tested for West Nile Virus. Acceptable birds include crows, blue jays, grackles, starlings, robins, cardinals, sparrows and finches.

Tips for Conserving Water

- Check faucets, pipes, and toilets regularly for leaks.
- When washing dishes by hand, do not leave water running for rinsing.
- Do not run the hose while washing the car.
- Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.
- Take shorter showers. Install water-saving low-flow shower heads.
- Plant drought-resistant shrubs and plants.

As a reminder, the Village's two new TIF districts will be the Southeast-II District and the Town Center-II District. The first district includes Wheeling's portion of Chicago Executive Airport and surrounding industrial and residential areas, some of which still lack water and sewer connections. The second district includes all the property along the north and south sides of Dundee Road between Wolf Road and Jack London Middle School, the site of major upcoming projects. On the vacant site next to the Village Hall, developers plan to build Wheeling Town Center, which will include 100,000 square feet of retail space, Flix Brewhouse (a first run movie/dinner theater), and 300 high-end apartment units. A second developer is prepared to build Northgate Crossings, a community of 288 high-end apartment units on the former Kenny Construction site on Northgate Parkway. These two projects will add nearly 600 new residences to the town center within walking distance of the Wheeling Metra Station. This TIF district will also give us the ability to revitalize retail areas such as the vacant former Kmart site at Dundee and Elmhurst roads. Redevelopment in these new TIF districts will ultimately result in new public revenues that increase our ability to provide needed services while reducing the tax burden on our citizens.

As your Village President, I am committed to making the future brighter for the Village of Wheeling and its residents. These two new TIF districts are essential ingredients of that brighter future—they represent our best chance to keep our community vibrant and successful for years to come. I hope you join me in enthusiastically supporting these projects, and I look forward to updating you on them in the months ahead.
