

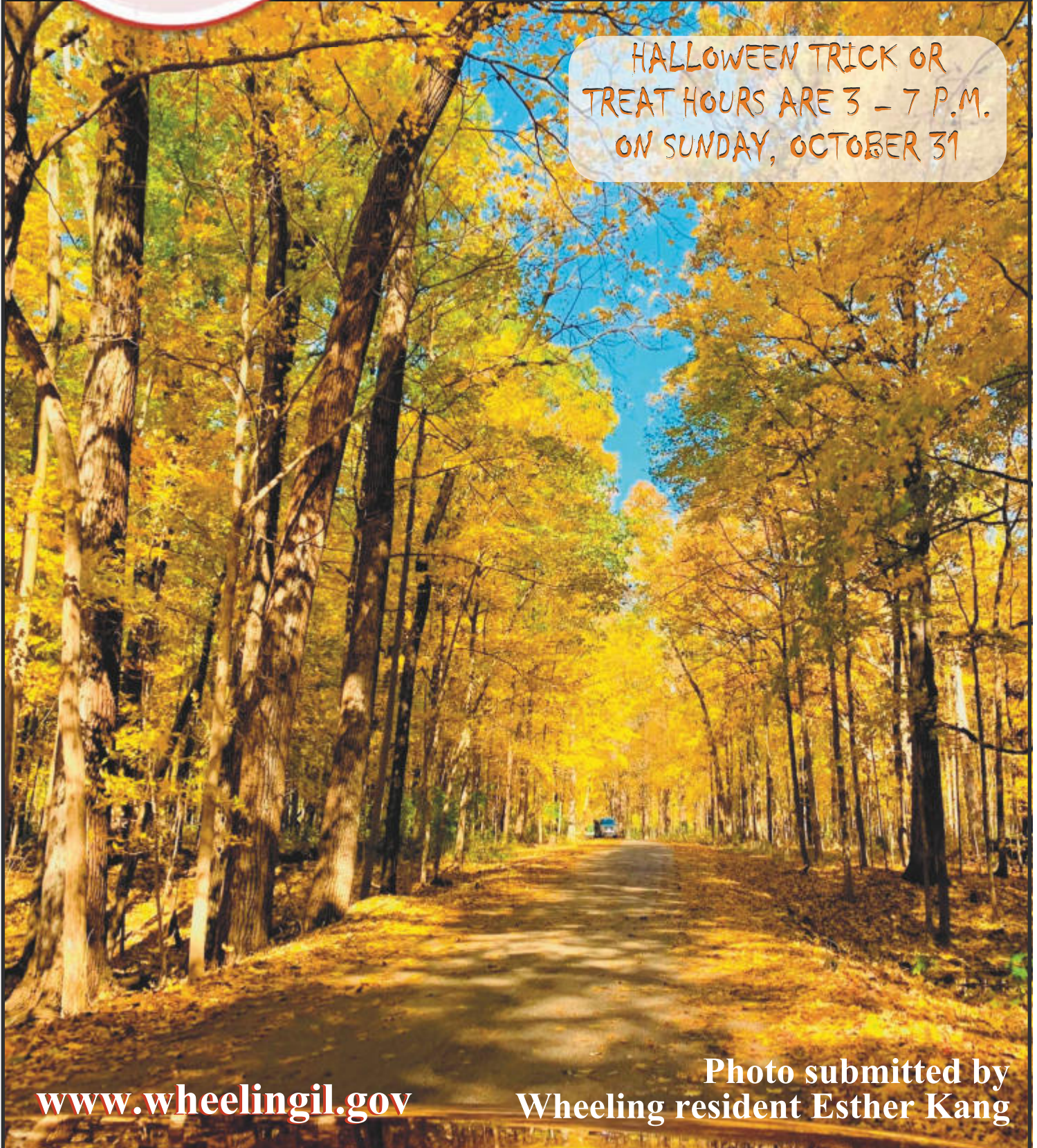

## From the Desk of President Horcher

In addition to prompting us to schedule the event later in the summer, the pandemic continues to impact our routines in large and small ways, especially as new COVID-19 variants emerge. I definitely encourage everyone to continue to be mindful of the welfare of others as we do our best to resume normal activities: follow local and national guidelines regarding face coverings and distancing, and talk to your healthcare provider about vaccination if you haven't done so already.

## Assist Homebuyer Program

The Village of Wheeling now offers a two-pronged approach to assist homebuyers. The Assist program provides families with funds to pay all or most of their closing costs and down payment, and the mortgage credit certificate (MCC) program reduces the homebuyer's ongoing cost of borrowing.

### What is Assist?

Assist is a program that offers individuals and families with 30-year fixed-rate mortgages and offers 3-7% cash assistance on the amount borrowed on a mortgage to qualified homebuyers. The cash assistance may be used to offset some or all of the home loan's down payment and closing costs. Assist minimizes the amount of money you need on hand to purchase your home.

### What are Mortgage Credit Certificates?

MCCs are a federally authorized program created as an alternative to tax-exempt housing bonds to reduce effective interest costs for qualifying homebuyers. MCCs allow the homebuyer to qualify for a federal income tax credit equal to a percentage of the interest paid on their home loan each year. MCC holders still qualify for a regular deduction of the remaining interest paid on their home loan.

# POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

## October is Fire Prevention Month!

In 1922, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) named the second week of October “Fire Prevention Week” in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. Today, we celebrate Fire Prevention Week and Month by raising fire safety awareness and educating families, students, and communities across the United States. During this month, fire departments provide education to their communities and encourage parents and loved ones to practice fire and whole-home safety. Fire Prevention week is the perfect time to talk with your whole family about fire safety—including testing alarms or upgrading to 10-year sealed battery alarms—and escape route planning.



### Did You Know?

- 3 of every 5 home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no working smoke alarms
- Less than 50% of homeowners have an escape plan
- Carbon monoxide (CO) is the #1 cause of accidental poisoning in the US
- 60% of consumers do not test their smoke and CO alarms monthly
- Only 47% of people report having CO alarms in their home
- Unattended cooking is the #1 cause of home fires

According to the latest NFPA report, working smoke alarms in the home reduce the risk of dying in a reported fire by more than half. Almost three out of five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or where smoke alarms failed to operate. Missing or non-functional power sources—including missing or disconnected batteries, dead batteries, and disconnected hard-wired alarms or other AC power issues—are the most common factors when smoke alarms fail to operate. People tend to remove smoke alarm batteries or dismantle alarms altogether when the alarm begins to chirp as a result of low batteries, the alarm no longer working properly, or when experiencing nuisance alarms. These behaviors present serious risks to safety that can have tragic consequences in the event of a fire.

This year’s Fire Prevention Week theme, “Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety,” helps people better understand the reasons smoke alarms may sound, and provides the know-how to effectively address them. The campaign also addresses special considerations for the deaf and hard of hearing, along with information about carbon monoxide alarms. Key things to remember:

- When a smoke alarm or CO alarm sounds, respond immediately by exiting the home as quickly as possible.
- If your alarm begins to chirp, it may mean that the batteries are running low and need to be replaced. If the alarm continues to chirp after the batteries are replaced, or the alarm is more than 10 years old, it is time to replace the alarm.
- Test all smoke and CO alarms monthly. Press the test button to make sure the alarm is working.
- If there is someone in your household who is deaf or hard of hearing, install bed shaker and strobe light alarms.
- Know the difference between the sound of a smoke alarm and a carbon monoxide alarm – three beeps for smoke alarms; four beeps for carbon monoxide alarms.

## Outside Burning Restrictions

The open burning of garbage, refuse, litter, waste paper, cardboard, plastic, landscape waste, leaves, construction debris, treated lumber, pallets, flammable and/or combustible liquids, wet or damp wood, and/or unseasoned wood are prohibited by both the Village’s Municipal Code and Fire Code. Violators are subject to citations and fines. Repeat offenders are subject to additional legal enforcement action by the Village.

Recreational fires using portable fireplaces at single-family homes and townhomes are permitted as long as they are used in accordance with the manufacturer’s instructions, are not operated within 15 feet of any structures or combustible materials (sheds, fences, etc.), and use only clean, seasoned, dry wood as the fuel source. It is important to remember to be a good neighbor and watch where the smoke is traveling. Work together with your neighbors so your fireplace smoke does not become a nuisance by blowing into their windows and doors.

Burning of landscape waste is strictly prohibited; it should be placed in appropriate landscape waste bags or containers and placed

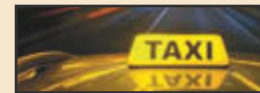

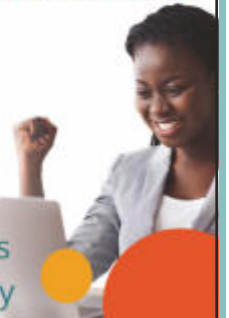

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT & PUBLIC WORKS

## Current Construction Projects

### [IDOT McHenry Road Bridge Project](#)

The bridge on McHenry Road north of Dundee Road is currently under construction for preventative maintenance. This project consists of approach-deck concrete reconstruction and pavement modifications. Due to this work, the bridge will be closed until approximately mid-October. Detour signs remain installed; residents are encouraged to allow extra time when driving through this area.

### [IDOT Wolf Road Project](#)

Phase I of the the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) reconstruction project on Wolf Road will be completed in the upcoming months. The current one-way traffic configuration is expected to be converted to one lane in each direction (north and south bound) near September 30, pending weather or other construction delays.

Strong Avenue west of Wolf Road—which was closed on May 14 due to watermain installation and construction—is expected to reopen by mid-September. At that time, Mayer Avenue will be closed; however, access to Wolf Road will always be maintained between one of these two streets. As winter approaches, the project will be placed on hold until spring of 2022.

Detour signs remain installed in these areas; residents are encouraged to allow extra time when driving through this area and should slow down and drive distraction-free through all work zones.

## Property Maintenance

Community Development property maintenance inspectors help ensure that properties in our community are observing the following property maintenance requirements:

- Maintain grass and weeds (maximum height eight inches).
- Maintain shrubs and trees, including removal or pruning of dead, overgrown, or improperly maintained plants.
- Keep building exterior free of cracking and peeling paint.
- Keep fences, sheds, and other accessory structures in good repair.
- Stow garbage cans in the garage or adjacent to the house in a side or rear yard between pick-up days.

If you notice ill-kept properties in your neighborhood, please contact Community Development at 847.459.2620 so our staff can investigate the status of the properties and take steps to re-establish maintenance. Residents can also call the anonymous code enforcement hotline at 847.459.CODE to leave a voicemail.

## Storm Drain Grate/Inlet Cleaning

Storm drain grates/inlets are normally located near the edge of streets or in rear yards, collecting water which uses the storm sewer system to ultimately flow into streams, rivers, or lakes. Grates/inlets obstructed with leaves and other debris can deny constant water flow and cause localized flooding. As snow melt occurs in spring, the Village encourages residents to safely clear storm sewer grates/inlets near their property to avoid local flooding issues. If a grate/inlet is obstructed, rake the debris off of the structure and onto the parkway or into a waste container. If ponding or another concern arises, contact Public Works 847.279.6900.

## Waste Management *At Your Door* Special Waste Collections

Residents with curbside collection can properly dispose of and recycle home-generated special materials safely, easily, and responsibly. The cost for the program is included in monthly rates, and curbside residents can utilize the program as many times during the year as necessary. Below is information on the At Your Door (AYD) service.

### What materials are collected through the AYD program?

Acceptable materials include, but may not be limited to, automotive products (antifreeze, batteries, brake fluid, motor oil, gasoline, and filters); garden chemicals (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, insect spray, weed killers); paint products (paint, caulk, glue, stain, thinner, wood preservative); household cleaners (ammonia, cleaning products, rust remover, tile/shower, and upholstery cleaners); items containing mercury (batteries, fluorescent lamp tubes, thermometers, and thermostats); sharps/needles/lancets (*only if placed in sealed, rigid, puncture-resistant containers*); and electronics (computers, monitors, keyboards, televisions, DVD/CD/VCR players, cell phones, printers, fax machines, microwaves).

Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, tires, or any unlabeled or leaking materials will not be collected.

### How do I schedule an AYD collection?

Curbside residents must contact WM in one of two ways, and should have the list of unwanted materials available for their information.

### What happens when I schedule a collection?

A collection kit will be sent via mail based on the item(s) being disposed. Residents must follow the directions in the collection kit for appropriate packaging and collection. If the materials for collection are unlabeled, leaking, or for some reason not acceptable, a door hanger will be left with further instructions.

When the package is ready for collection, place the package outdoors, near the side door, or by the garage, on the specific designated collection date provided by Waste Management. Do not place the package near the curb or street. Residents do not need to be present during collections.

## Guidelines for Leaf Disposal

*Village Code 11.08.100 prohibits the deposit of leaves into streets, roads, or highways, and along the shoulder, curb, or edge of any street, road, or highway.*

- Leaves intentionally raked into such areas can result in clogged storm sewer drains and subsequent flooding.
- The Village's contract with Waste Management provides an alternate, convenient method to dispose of leaves and other forms of yard waste for residents of single-family homes.
- In addition to two-ply Kraft biodegradable paper yard waste bags, residents may use rigid 32-gallon containers clearly marked with a red "X" around the container.
- Containers and biodegradable bags, when filled, may not exceed 50 pounds in weight. There is no limit to the number of yard waste bags or containers allowed.
- Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected.
- Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 50 lbs., exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles allowed.
- Loose or larger brush or logs will not be collected by Waste Management.
- Yard waste collections conclude on November 30, 2021.

## School Zone Safety Reminder

With in-person school back in session, the Wheeling Police want to remind you of the following:

**School Zones:** The speed limit in all Wheeling school zones is 20 miles per hour, and is in effect from **7 a.m. – 4 p.m.** on days when school is in session and children are present on the sidewalks or in the area.

**Stopping for Loading and Unloading School Buses:** Illinois law requires that drivers *stop* and *not pass* school buses that have their red lights flashing with the stop sign arm extended. Vehicles that are in oncoming traffic in relation to a stopped school bus on a four-lane roadway are not required to stop under the law.

**Disobeying a Crossing Guard:** Illinois law makes disobeying a Crossing Guard a *moving violation*. A court appearance by the violator is required.

**Cellular Phones:** Cellular phone use when driving is prohibited by state law. Cellular phones may NOT be used in *any mode* in school zones or construction zones. This means that you cannot use a cell phone even in Bluetooth or hands-free mode in either location.

**Texting While Driving:** Texting while driving is *prohibited at all times* throughout the state of Illinois. The law defines texting as “electronic mail, a text message, an instant message or a command or request to access an internet site.”

## Lunch @ The Center

Nutritionally-balanced lunches are available for pickup for older adults, 60 years and better, Monday – Friday from 9:45 a.m. – 10:45 a.m. from the Wheeling Park District Community Resource Center, 100 Community Boulevard. The pickup site is the preschool drop-off site on the west side of the building. Please be on time, as this area is being shared with other programs. Meals will not be available for pickup after 10:45 a.m.

Limited in-person dining is also available for those who are ready to return to the congregate setting. These lunches take place at the Wheeling Park District Community Recreation Center Monday – Friday from 11:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. Reservations are required. The Lunch at the Center program will follow the Illinois Department of Public Health, Cook County Department of Public Health, and the Illinois Department on Aging guidelines for congregate settings to make sure participants are safe and healthy. The program will remain in a hybrid format, which will allow those seniors who do not wish to dine in-person, yet want to continue to receive nutritious meals and friendly conversation, to drive through and pick up their meals.

The suggested donation for meals is \$5. No one will be turned away for inability to donate. Lunch at the Center is committed to providing meals to all older/active adults 60 and better, regardless of ability to pay. Funds for this program are provided through an award from
