From the Desk of President Horcher

On behalf of the Village Board, I'd like to wish every member of the Wheeling community a very happy New Year. While some burdens of the pandemic remain with us, others are easing, and we're optimistic for a bright future.

After many socially-distant months, it was especially nice to see the faces of our residents at the Lights Around Wheeling event, which had to take a break in 2020. We're grateful to all those who attended, particularly Mike and Kathy Burns, the 2021 recipients of the Village's George Hieber Citizenship Award, who performed the important task of flipping the switch to light the holiday lights. The George Hieber Citizenship Award was created in honor of longtime resident George Hieber and his many contributions to civic life in Wheeling, over many years and in a number of capacities. Each year the Village Board chooses a resident—or a group or partnership of residents—to receive this award based on their significant contributions to the Wheeling community, and Mike and Kathy were chosen in 2021 for their service through specific volunteer groups such as Wheeling Helping Hands and in more formal commissioner roles on the Wheeling Plan Commission and Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners. The recipient of the 2022 George Hieber Citizenship Award will be announced at a Village Board meeting in January.

The holiday season is a time for celebrating with friends and family, but for most of us it's also a time for giving and receiving gifts. If you were lucky enough to receive gift cards last year, I'd definitely encourage you to spend them at retailers and restaurants in Wheeling whenever you can. Our businesses always appreciate the patronage of their neighbors, and the small amount of tax revenue collected on such sales adds up to a meaningful investment in the community. There are many things that residents can do to help make Wheeling stronger and more prosperous, and shopping locally is near the top of that list.

Fortunately, signs of prosperity continue to appear throughout town. In November we held the eagerly-awaited ribbon-cutting ceremony for Meat & Potato Urban Kitchen, the latest restaurant to open in Wheeling Town Center, the transit-oriented mixed-use development on the south side of Dundee Road. We also celebrated a milestone in the progress of the London Crossing development on the south side of Dundee west of the railroad tracks: the start of the construction of School District 21's new Community Service and District Administrative Center. The Center is the first component of the mixed-use project that Wingspan Development is building on the 11.5 acres immediately east of Jack London Middle School, which will ultimately include commercial tenants and 55 townhomes.

The ongoing transformation of the Dundee corridor is a testament to decades of careful planning and policymaking by the Village's officials and staff, and those efforts continue elsewhere in Wheeling. In keeping with the goals set in our Strategic Plan, the Village recently selected a team of consultants led by the Lakota Group to research business conditions along Milwaukee Avenue and prepare a Restaurant Row Corridor Plan: a set of coordinated policies and strategies to strengthen Wheeling's portion of this critical regional thoroughfare. The plan will incorporate recommendations regarding streetscape improvements, enhancements to new and existing dining options, and future development along the corridor. Public input will be an important part of this process, so we encourage all residents to visit the project website (www.wheelingrestaurantrowplan.com) to learn more, including information about upcoming events related to the study.

We'll be back in touch with more updates—and an overview of 2021—in a couple of months. Until then, please accept our best wishes for a safe and prosperous 2022!

Assist Homebuyer Program

The Village of Wheeling now offers a two-pronged approach to assist homebuyers. The Assist program provides families with funds to pay all or most of their closing costs and down payment, and the mortgage credit certificate (MCC) program reduces the homebuyer's ongoing cost of borrowing.



What is Assist?

Assist is a program that offers individuals and families with 30-year fixed-rate mortgages and offers 3-7% cash assistance on the amount borrowed on a mortgage to qualified homebuyers. The cash assistance may be used to offset some or all of the home loan's down payment and closing costs. Assist minimizes the amount of money you need on hand to purchase your home.

What are Mortgage Credit Certificates?

MCCs are a federally authorized program created as an alternative to tax-exempt housing bonds to reduce effective interest costs for qualifying homebuyers. MCCs allow the homebuyer to qualify for a federal income tax credit equal to a percentage of the interest paid on their home loan each year. MCC holders still qualify for a regular deduction of the remaining interest paid on their home loan.

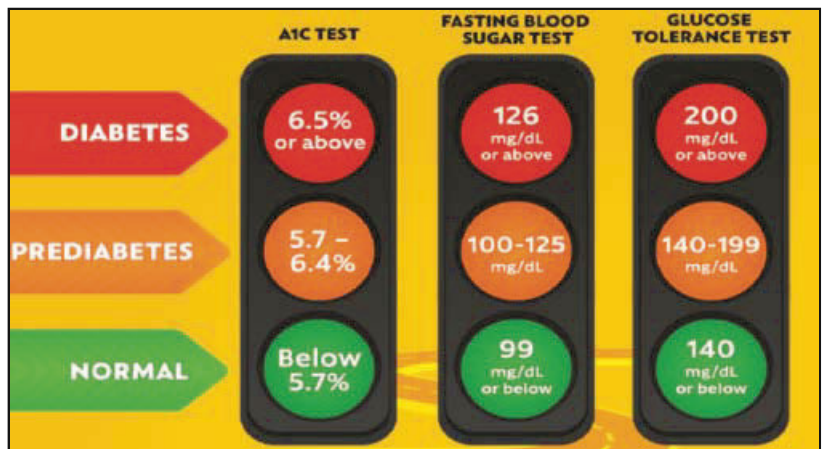

Health Happenings



Do You Know Your Quality of Life Number?

The "Quality of Life" test, also known as the A1c or HbA1c blood test, measures the amount of sugar that's attached to your red blood cells. The test shows your average blood sugar during the previous 90 days. Elevated blood sugars cause damage to large and small blood vessels and affect your immune system.



Think of your A1c result as your "Quality of Life" number because the lower the number, the less chance you will have complications of diabetes such as kidney failure, blindness, limb amputation, strokes, heart attacks, and death. The normal A1c for a healthy person without diabetes who is not overweight is 5% or below. According to the American Diabetes Association, the diagnosis of diabetes is an A1c of 6.5% or higher and the diagnosis of pre-diabetes is an A1c of 5.7 to 6.4%. But don't be fooled: pre-diabetes can cause damage as well. If your A1c is above 5.7%, you need to make some changes to prevent complications. In the Epic-Norfolk Study, researchers compared the A1c results of 9,000 people, some of whom had diabetes. Compared to people who had an A1c of 5% and below, women whose A1c's were higher than 6% had a 28% increase in cardiovascular death, and men with A1c's higher than 6% had a 26% increase. Take control of your "Quality of Life" today by increasing your physical activity and reducing your carbohydrate intake to keep your A1c in a healthy range.

Catalytic Converter Theft Skyrocketing Nationwide

Catalytic converter thefts in the Wheeling area continue, especially in apartment and condo communities. Please read the article below and—we cannot emphasize this enough—CALL 911 FOR ANY SUSPICIOUS OR UNUSUAL CONSTRUCTION-TYPE NOISE OR ACTIVITY DURING NIGHTTIME HOURS.

According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB), catalytic converter thefts have seen a significant increase across the country since March of 2020, the start of the global pandemic. “Vehicle thefts, carjackings, and break-ins are all crimes we’ve witnessed trending upward for several months, and now catalytic converter thefts are also on the rise,” said David Glawe, president and CEO of NICB. “We have seen a significant increase during the pandemic. It’s an opportunistic crime. As the value of the precious metals contained within the catalytic converters continues to increase, so do the number of thefts of these devices. There is a clear connection between times of crisis, limited resources, and disruption of the supply chain that drives investors towards these precious metals.”

A catalytic converter is a device that looks like a small muffler attached to the exhaust system. It is designed to convert the environmentally hazardous exhaust emitted by an engine into less harmful gasses. To do this, manufacturers use platinum, palladium, or rhodium. In recent years, the values of these precious metals have increased significantly. As of December 2020, rhodium was valued at \$14,500 per ounce, palladium at \$2,336 per ounce, and platinum at \$1,061 per ounce. Typically, recyclers will pay \$50 to \$250 per catalytic converter.

According to NICB, there were 108 catalytic converter thefts per month on average in 2018, 282 average monthly thefts in 2019, and 1,203 average thefts per month in 2020. During this time period, the top five states for catalytic converter thefts were California, Texas, Minnesota, North Carolina, and Illinois. In 2020, there was a continual climb in thefts. January had the fewest number of thefts at 652, but it continued to climb markedly throughout the year, with December having 2,347 thefts. As of the end of February 2021, 18 states—Arkansas, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, and West Virginia—are evaluating potential legislative actions to curb the theft problem.

“Removing a catalytic converter takes only minutes using some basic, readily-available, battery-operated tools from a local hardware store,” added Glawe. “And for the vehicle owner, it’s costly due to the loss of work, finding and paying for alternate transportation, and then paying anywhere from \$1,000 to \$3,000 to get your vehicle fixed.”

In some cases, this theft is covered by insurance. The optional comprehensive portion of your insurance policy covers this kind of loss. However, the owner will be responsible for paying the deductible. If your deductible is \$1,000 and the cost to repair the damage costs \$1,000 or maybe a few hundred dollars more, drivers may not opt to file a claim. The NICB advises drivers to contact their insurer to report the theft and determine the best course of action.

Snow Season Procedures

Public Works snow and ice responsibilities include roadway de-icing and clearing arterial, collector, and residential roadways, certain sections of public sidewalks, the train station, and Village-owned buildings and properties. Public Works is not responsible for the maintenance of or snow control on county- or state-owned roadways or rights-of-way. These roadways include:

Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) 847-705-4222

- Dundee Road (Route 68)
- Milwaukee Avenue (Route 21)
- Palatine Road including East and West Palatine frontage
- Wolf Road (Manchester North to Milwaukee Avenue; South of Marquardt to Camp McDonald Road)

- McHenry Road (Route 83)

Residents are advised of the following safety tips during the snow season:

- Stay 100 feet or more behind a snowplow or salt truck.
- When it is safe, shovel snow away from fire hydrants near your property for emergency access.
- Do not place refuse, refuse containers, or any other items in the street.

Vehicle Parking Restrictions

- Do not park on any Village street within eight hours after a snowfall of two inches or more to allow safe and efficient snow and ice control by Public Works.
- Vehicles in violation of this restriction may be towed by the Police Department.

Sidewalk Requirements

- Residents and property owners are responsible for clearing snow and ice from sidewalks adjoining or adjacent to their property by 10 a.m. the day after a snowfall. Property owners are permitted to spread sand, salt, or other substances made for the purpose of melting snow and ice on sidewalks.
- Residents and property owners shall not deposit snow or ice onto any roadway within the Village; instead, deposit snow and ice onto the parkway.

Protect Water Lines from Freezing

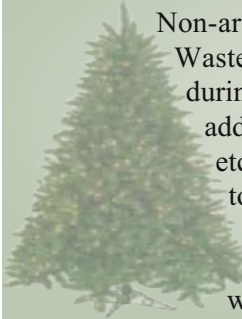
Follow these measures to protect water lines from freezing and prevent water pipes from rupturing during extreme cold:

- Monitor water meters: Wrap water meters with foam insulation or heat tape if located in unheated or colder areas such as crawlspaces. Periodically check your meter and associated piping for cracks or leaks and ensure proper marking and operation of the shut-off valve in case a pipe bursts.
- Eliminate drafts: All crawlspace and basement vents, windows, and doors should be repaired and closed, making sure a tight seal keeps out cold air.
- Insulate pipes: Insulating pipes in colder or unheated areas such as the crawlspace, or pipes located adjacent to an outside wall, helps to reduce the possibility of ruptured pipes. Allow warm air to circulate around pipes accessible by cabinets and located against outside walls.
- Leave faucets running: Keeping a trickle of cold water running can reduce the possibility of a pipe bursting due to freezing.

If you know that a property has been unoccupied for several days, contact the Public Works Utility Division at 847.279.6900 so they can verify if water services are shut off at the property. This can prevent costly damage to the unoccupied property.

Holiday Recycling Programs

Tree Collections



Non-artificial holiday trees are collected by Waste Management at residential curbsides during the first two weeks in January at no additional charge. All decorations, stands, etc. must be removed from trees for them to be collected. Please do not place trees in plastic bags. Trees that have decorations or are in stands or plastic bags will not be collected.

Lights Recycling

Residents may recycle holiday lights including mini, C7, C9, rope, and LED lights and extension cords—all colors and lengths—at the Department of Public Works, 77 W. Hintz Road, Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Garland, live greens, wreaths, and other non-recyclables are not accepted in this recycling program. The program concludes February 28, 2022. Buried Hydrants

Heavy snowfall or snow plowed from roadways can bury hydrants, thus making it difficult to find and use them during firefighting.

The Public Works and Fire Departments seek assistance from residents and businesses in uncovering buried hydrants that are closest to their property. In doing so, we ask that snow be removed approximately three feet away from the hydrant in all directions, and a pathway cleared between the hydrant and the nearest roadway. Exercise caution when clearing around the hydrant because of the potential for vehicle traffic nearby. Do not stand in the street and be careful not to slip and fall into the roadway. With the arrival of cold weather, our municipal inspectors would like to remind all landlords and residential property owners that per Village Code 15.16.001 (d), heat must be supplied to your building from September 15–May 15 and kept at a temperature no lower than 68 degrees. 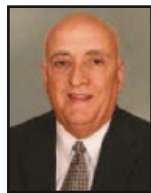

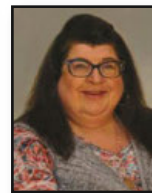
