As another summer comes to a close, I'd like to thank everyone who participated in this year's Rock 'n' Run the Runway, including Chicago Executive Airport and the City of Prospect Heights for their partnership, and business sponsors Wheel-Inn, Richelieu Foods, Ozinga, Waste Management, the Wheeling Park District, DTK Stoneworks, and Klein, Thorpe and Jenkins. Most of all, thank you to the staff of the Village of Wheeling for their hard work bringing this beloved community celebration back to its pre-pandemic format and scope.

Thank you also to those who came out for the annual National Night Out event held at the Wheeling Park District. This community event continues to grow each year, and each year I'm more proud of our public safety personnel who come out to meet with our residents. We all work for you, the residents, and building trust and relationships is paramount to our ability to do our jobs effectively, especially those who work in public safety. We hope this event continues to flourish each year.

I'd like to invite you all to partake in more of Wheeling's traditional events. The first is the Village's Community Breakfast, which will be held on September 24 at Fire Station 42 at 1 Community Blvd. As in the past, the only price of admission is a canned good or another nonperishable food item, which the Village will donate to local food pantries. You'll find more information about the breakfast on Page 10.

The second, of course, is Halloween, on which trick-or-treating will happen during the customary hours of 3-7 p.m. We encourage Wheeling families to enjoy the holiday while being safe and responsible. Families who choose to accept trick-or-treaters should leave a porch light on, and we ask that our trick-or-treaters only visit homes with these lights on.

In development news, the Village of Wheeling recently welcomed Cinergy Entertainment to Wheeling Town Center. This award-winning family entertainment company purchased the former CMX location in June 2022 and re-opened the 40,000-square-foot dine-in theater to the public on July 15. You can view the latest movies in luxurious reclining theater seats right here in Wheeling!

Other commercial progress being made around Wheeling includes the new Popeyes which started construction on Dundee Road next to Dunkin' Donuts, District Brew Yards which is set to open very soon in the former RAM Restaurant property at 700 N. Milwaukee Avenue, West Town Bakery opening after renovations are complete just across the street at 781 N. Milwaukee Avenue, and Mochinut—a Korean-style dessert shop—coming to 322 N. Milwaukee Avenue. The Board and I hope you all will enjoy this diverse mix of new culinary offerings!

As Wheeling continues to evolve, so also must our infrastructure. Recently, the Village Board approved plans for a new fire station on Village-owned land on the west side of the railroad tracks at 135 McHenry Road. The new Station 42 will replace the current station on Dundee Road, which shares a space with the police station. Though we are not creating an additional station, the new location of Station 42 serves to fulfill a need for public safety services to be more readily available in the northwest quadrant of town. Partial funding for this project comes from federal assistance available through the American Recovery Plan Act, which provided municipalities with funds to reinvest back into their communities after weathering the impact of COVID-19. Additionally, we are saving money on this project by replicating the design of the recently-rebuilt Fire Station 23 on Wheeling Road. The Board and I feel this is an important reinvestment into our community, and a wise use of grant funds.

I look forward to continuing to update you on these and other developments around town. On behalf of the Village Board and the Village staff, I hope you have a happy and healthy autumn!

Flu Vaccine Clinic at Village Hall



The Village of Wheeling has partnered with Jewel-Osco to offer a flu vaccine clinic to Wheeling residents.

Where: Wheeling Village Hall, 2 Community Blvd.

When: Thursday, September 29, 2022, 1:30-3:30 p.m.

Also being offered: tetanus, shingles and pneumonia, COVID-19 initial dose, and COVID-19 boosters.

To schedule an appointment for influenza (flu), shingles, tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (Tdap), and/or pneumonia vaccines please visit www.wheelingil.gov and click the COVID-19 icon at the very top of the homepage.

- If you are a PPO participant, the flu vaccination is free with most insurances. Please check your co-pay as there may be a cost for the remaining vaccines.
- If you are an HMO participant, the flu vaccination is \$40. Please check with your primary physician for a no-cost flu shot and the other offered vaccinations through the managed care plan network.
- COVID-19 vaccinations, including the booster, are FREE for everyone.

October is Fire Prevention Month!

In 1922, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) named the second week of October Fire Prevention Week and October as Fire Prevention Month in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. Today, we celebrate Fire Prevention Week and Month by raising firesafety awareness and educating families, students, and communities across the United States. During this month, fire departments provide education to their communities and encourage parents and loved ones to practice fire and whole-home safety. Fire Prevention Month is the perfect time to talk with your family about fire safety—including testing alarms or upgrading to 10-year sealed battery alarms—and escape route planning.



Fire Prevention Week turns 100 years old this October, marking a momentous milestone for the annual campaign, which serves as the longest-running U.S. public health observance on record. Great strides have been made in reducing the public's risk to fire over the past century. Fire departments and public safety advocates have played a critical role in that success: it's progress we can all be proud of. Meanwhile, the home fire death rate—which has largely remained stagnant over the years—has seen a slight uptick recently. In fact, a person is more likely to die in a home fire today than in 1980. These numbers tell us that there's much more work to do when it comes to better educating people about the critical importance of knowing how to escape a home fire quickly and safely.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign theme, "**Fire won't wait. Plan your escape,**" works to address this very issue, reinforcing that today's home fires burn hotter and faster. Regardless of where or with whom you live, developing and practicing a home escape plan with all members of the household can make a life-saving difference.

Home fire escape planning and practicing

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!

Smoke alarms

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms. Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear



4 the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

Outside Burning Restrictions

The open burning of garbage, refuse, litter, waste paper, cardboard, plastic, landscape waste, leaves, construction debris, treated lumber, pallets, flammable and/or combustible liquids, wet or damp wood, and/or unseasoned wood are prohibited by both the Village's Municipal Code and Fire Code. Violators are subject to citations and fines. Repeat offenders are subject to additional legal enforcement action by the Village.

Recreational fires using portable fireplaces at single-family homes and townhomes are permitted as long as they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, are not operated within 15 feet of any structures or combustible materials (sheds, fences, etc.), and use only clean, seasoned, dry wood as the fuel source. It is important to remember to be a good neighbor and watch where the smoke is traveling. Work together with your neighbors so your fireplace smoke does not become a nuisance by blowing into their windows and doors.

Burning of landscape waste is strictly prohibited; it should be placed in appropriate landscape waste bags or containers and placed at the curb for regular weekly pick-up by Waste Management. See Page 9 for additional details.

Protect Yourself from Identity Theft

Identity theft occurs when a criminal obtains your personal information—such as your credit card, bank account, or social security number—to purchase goods and services fraudulently. It can be a single event in which someone purchases an item with your credit card, or it can be ongoing, such as when someone uses your information to obtain utility service or your social security number to work illegally. It can take a great deal of time and money to resolve the fraud once you realize you have become victimized.

Tips to Protect Yourself

- Do NOT give out personal information over the phone, through the mail, or over the internet unless you have initiated the contact and know who is receiving your information.
- Shred all documents with personal information, including preapproved credit card offers, insurance and medical forms, bank and credit card statements, and other documents with financial information. You can opt out of credit card offers through www.optoutprescreen.com.
- Protect your social security number – do not print it on checks or include it on job applications.
- Protect your computer through the use of “firewalls.” Use anti-virus software and keep it up to date.
- Obtain a copy of your credit report every few months. The Fair Credit Reporting Act allows you to get one free credit report per year from each of the three major credit bureaus. Visit www.annualcreditreport.com.
- Use strong passwords with a mix of at least eight letters (upper and lowercase), numbers, and symbols, and keep them private.
- Watch for “shoulder surfing” criminals who look over your shoulder to obtain your credit card number or PIN. When shopping, keep the card in your wallet until needed.
- Use secure websites for credit card purchases. Look for “https” in the web address, or a padlock symbol.
- Monitor your credit card accounts:
 - Know when bills should arrive, and contact the creditor if they don't, as someone may have filled out a change of address.
 - Compare your purchase receipts against your credit card statement.
 - Cancel credit cards you don't need and only carry the cards you do need.
 - Make a list of all credit card account numbers and phone numbers. Keep it in a secure location so that you can easily report them stolen if your wallet is missing.

Steps to Take if You are a Victim of Identity Theft

- File a police report in the jurisdiction in which the crime occurred
- Report fraud to creditors and then close accounts and ask for new cards/account numbers
- Place a “FRAUD ALERT” on your credit file. This prevents someone from opening credit in your name, but also means you will need to verify via phone any credit that you attempt to obtain. A Fraud Alert can be done through any of the three credit bureaus.

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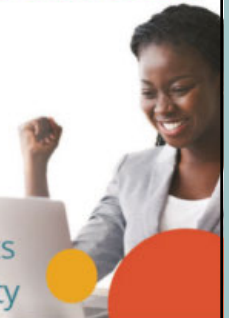

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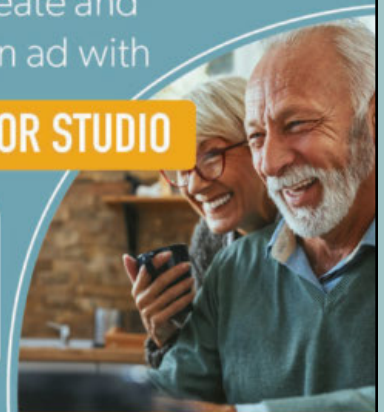

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT & PUBLIC WORKS

Community Rating System (CRS)

The Community Rating System (CRS) is a program started in 1990 under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The objective of the CRS is to reward those communities that are doing more than the minimum NFIP requirements to help their residents prevent or reduce flood losses. The CRS is a voluntary incentive-based program that rewards property owners when local governments undertake selective activities that reduce flood damage to existing buildings, manage development in areas not mapped by the NFIP, protect new buildings beyond minimum NFIP protection level, help insurance agents obtain flood data, and help people obtain flood insurance. The reward is in the form of discounts to flood insurance premium rates on flood insurance policies sold for properties within the community.



There are ten classes in the CRS. Class 1 requires the most credit points and gives the largest premium reduction, while Class 10 is the entry level into the CRS and carries no premium reduction. The Village of Wheeling is currently rated Class 6 under the CRS, which translates to a 20% reduction in flood insurance rates for local residents and businesses.

Wildlife Control

The Village of Wheeling has an abundance of wildlife, and in most instances people and wildlife can coexist. It is not uncommon for raccoons, skunks, coyotes, rabbits, and waterfowl to travel the neighborhoods at night. It is also not uncommon to encounter wildlife in your yard or while you are out walking through the village. Changes in habitat and the different seasons will cause fluctuations in wildlife population and travel.

Guidelines for wildlife encounters:

- Please do not feed wildlife
- Secure all trash in garbage cans with the lid closed tightly
- Do not handle orphaned offspring or sick wildlife
- Do not try to approach or corner wildlife



Feeding wildlife will cause them to discontinue foraging, making them dependent on human interaction. Further, human food is not appropriate nutrition for wild animals. This can cause them to become sick, and sometimes starve to death. Garbage can also become a food source for them, so it's important to ensure all garbage is placed in your Waste Management toter with the lid closed, or inside of your community's or business's secured dumpster. The Wheeling Municipal Code states that all trash receptacles must be covered with a lid; failure to do so can result in a citation and fine. SWANCC

The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) is an intergovernmental agency that focuses on diverting as much material as possible from disposal by recycling or reuse. SWANCC is a great resource for residents who may need to locate recycling services for particular items such as tires, or obtain educational information on eco cleaning, marketplace or landscaping. Storm Drain Grate/Inlet Cleaning

Storm drain grates/inlets are normally located near the edge of streets or in rear yards, collecting water which uses the storm sewer system to ultimately flow into streams, rivers, or lakes. Grates/inlets obstructed with leaves and other debris can deny constant water flow and cause localized flooding. The Village encourages residents to safely clear storm sewer grates/inlets near their property to avoid local flooding issues. If a grate/inlet is obstructed, rake the debris off of the structure and onto the parkway or into a waste container. If ponding or another concern arises, contact Public Works 847.279.6900.

The Village encourages residents to help remove debris from storm sewer inlets.

Waste Management *At Your Door* Special Waste Collections

Residents with curbside collection can properly dispose of and recycle home-generated special materials safely, easily, and responsibly. The cost for the program is included in monthly rates, and curbside residents can utilize the program as many times during the year as necessary. Below is information on the At Your Door (AYD) service.

What materials are collected through the AYD program?

Acceptable materials include, but may not be limited to, automotive products (antifreeze, batteries, brake fluid, motor oil, gasoline, and filters); garden chemicals (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, insect spray, weed killers); paint products (paint, caulk, glue, stain, thinner, wood preservative); household cleaners (ammonia, cleaning products, rust remover, tile/shower, and upholstery cleaners); items containing mercury (batteries, fluorescent lamp tubes, thermometers, and thermostats); sharps/needles/lancets (*only if placed in sealed, rigid, puncture-resistant containers*); and electronics (computers, monitors, keyboards, televisions, DVD/CD/VCR players, cell phones, printers, fax machines, microwaves).

Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, tires, or any unlabeled or leaking materials will not be collected.

How do I schedule an AYD collection?

Curbside residents must contact WM in one of two ways, and should have the list of unwanted materials available for their information.

- Call (800) 449-7587 CST, M-F from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Go to www.wmatyourdoor.com and complete a request form

What happens when I schedule a collection?

A collection kit will be sent via mail based on the item(s) being disposed. Residents must follow the directions in the collection kit for appropriate packaging and collection. If the materials for collection are unlabeled, leaking, or for some reason not acceptable, a door hanger will be left with further instructions.

When the package is ready for collection, place the package outdoors, near the side door or by the garage, on the specific designated collection date provided by Waste Management. Do not place the package near the curb or street. Residents do not need to be present during collections.

Guidelines for Leaf Disposal

Village Code 11.08.100 prohibits the deposit of leaves into streets, roads, or highways, and along the shoulder, curb, or edge of any street, road, or highway.

- Leaves intentionally raked into such areas can result in clogged storm sewer drains and subsequent flooding.
- The Village's contract with Waste Management provides an alternate, convenient method to dispose of leaves and other forms of yard waste for residents who have curbside pick-up service.
- In addition to two-ply Kraft biodegradable paper yard waste bags, residents may use rigid 32-gallon containers clearly marked with a red "X" around the container.
- Containers and biodegradable bags, when filled, may not exceed 45 pounds in weight when filled. There is no limit to the number of yard waste bags or containers allowed.
- Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected.
- Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 45 lbs., exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles allowed.
- Loose or larger brush or logs will not be collected by Waste Management.
- Yard waste collections conclude on November 30, 2022.

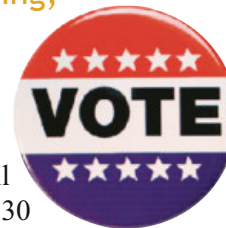

Voter Registration

If you are not yet registered, you can do so at the Village Hall Monday–Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. You may also register online at ova.elections.il.gov. **The last days to register to vote for the Gubernatorial Election are October 11 for in-person registration and October 23 for online registration. Mailed paper applications must be postmarked by October 11.** If you miss these deadlines, registration is available at early voting locations until November 7; after registering you must immediately cast your ballot. Election Day registration is available at your home precinct only.

Early and Mail Voting

Early voting for the November 6 Gubernatorial Election runs **October 24–November 7**. Locations can be found online at cookcountyclerk.com. You can request a mail ballot from now until November 3; applications are available at the Cook County Clerk's website and at Village Hall. Mail ballots must be postmarked by November 8.

Cook County is now offering **Permanent Vote By Mail**. This option will allow you to vote by mail in all subsequent elections held in Cook County. You will still have the option to vote by mail in a single election if you so choose. Please note: If you change your voting residence and move within Suburban Cook County, you must re-register at your new address. Your permanent vote by mail status will remain the same and be updated to the new address.

If you would like to change your permanent vote by mail option at any time, please contact the Cook County Clerk's Office Mail Voting Unit at 312.603.0946.

Election Day

On Tuesday, November 8 polls are open from 6 a.m.–7 p.m. If you are unsure of your precinct and polling location, please contact the Village's Administration Department at 847.499.9082 or visit cookcountyclerk.com, where you can also verify your registration and view a sample ballot. All voters are encouraged to verify their registration before arriving at the polls.

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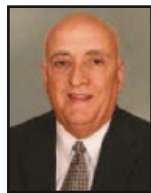

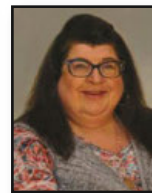
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
