From the Desk of President Horcher

In keeping with tradition, I'd like to open this March–April newsletter with a brief update on the state of the Village of Wheeling. Thanks to forward-thinking policymaking and careful management, the Village's finances remain in excellent shape, enabling us to keep investing in infrastructure and economic development without an increase to the 2024 property tax levy. As always, I commend the Village staff for their hard work and expertise, our volunteer commissioners for their valuable guidance, and my fellow elected officials for their leadership and good judgment. It's an honor to work with all of you.

A key to our prosperity has been seeking alternate sources of funding, something we do consistently, but that's been notable in recent years with the increased availability of federal, state, and regional assistance. In 2023 we made substantial progress toward our long-held goal of building a freestanding fire station west of the railroad tracks, and it will soon become the new site of Fire Station 42, which currently shares a facility with the Police Department. That project is funded through the American Rescue Plan Act, which also enabled us to replace failing watermain throughout the Lakeside Villas subdivision last year; meanwhile, Rebuild Illinois funds allowed us to make much-needed improvements to Northgate Parkway and Chaddick Drive. We're in the process of arranging federal and state funding for upcoming projects that include the reconstruction of Wheeling Road and streambank stabilization along Buffalo Creek.

We completed several other important projects last year, some more visible than others. Our staff upgraded the enterprise resource planning software used to perform many of the Village's basic functions, a major undertaking that involved every department. We began the complex process of transferring our public safety dispatch services to Northwest Central Dispatch System, a change that will maintain our responsiveness and financial sustainability while being mostly transparent to the public. We helped reestablish the Quiet Zone that limits train horn use between Wheeling and the Wisconsin state line, and we installed storm sewer on Dundee Road that will enable the future redevelopment of properties along that corridor. Next year we'll make progress on the installation of watermain and sidewalks on South Milwaukee Avenue and on stormwater control in South Dunhurst.

The ultimate aim of all these projects is to improve our residents' quality of life, often by encouraging beneficial private-sector activity. For example, as London Crossing has progressed with the completion of the first townhomes, the Village signed a redevelopment agreement to assist the construction of the \$10.8 million commercial portion of the project. We recently approved a Restaurant & Retail Build-Out Grant to help the expansion of Pirosmanni Georgia Food Art on Dundee, having successfully used the program last year to assist a substantial renovation at Cooper's Hawk. Just across Milwaukee Avenue, Armo Grill recently opened with the Village's help through a Cook County property tax incentive; we're planning other initiatives in this area soon, guided by the Restaurant Row Corridor Plan. And supporting Wheeling's industrial sector remains a top priority, with the renovation and reoccupancy of seven vacant properties incentivized last year through Class 6b tax abatements. We recently celebrated the opening of the 53-unit Union Apartments on Wheeling Road, the latest step in the transformation of central Wheeling. Direct marketing company SG360°, Wheeling's largest employer, recently announced a large expansion of its local operations, and aviation development company Sky Harbour plans to construct 130,000 square feet of hangar and office facilities at Chicago Executive Airport. The Village will continue to use the tools at our disposal to promote business activity that benefits our community.

I opened this letter with thanks to the Village's staff, and I'll close by welcoming a new member of our management team: Fire Chief Scott Salela, recently chosen from a field of 37 qualified candidates after a national search. Chief Salela has over 30 years of experience in the fire service, most recently with the City of Naperville. Only Wheeling's fourth chief since the conversion from an all-volunteer force in 1969, Chief Salela is well-equipped to maintain the proven excellence and expertise of our Fire Department personnel.

We'll be back with more updates in what promises to be an eventful year. For now, we wish you a happy and prosperous 2024!

The Presidential Primary Election is March 19, 2024

Are you registered to vote?

Though in-person voter registration ended on February 20, there are still plenty of ways to register to vote in the Presidential Primary. Online registration is open through March 3, 2024. If you have an Illinois driver's license or state ID, you can register online at www.ova.elections.il.gov.

You may also register to vote during Early Voting at a designated Early Voting location or on Election Day at your home precinct. See below for more information.



Vote By Mail

Mail ballot applications are now available. You can download an application in your language of choice. Mail ballot applications must be returned to Cook County by March 14, 2024.

Early Voting

For the March 19, 2024 Presidential Primary Election traditional Early Voting will take place March 4-18. If you plan to register during Early Voting, bring two qualifying forms of ID; one must show your current address. You will cast your ballot immediately after registering.

Election Day Voting

Registered suburban Cook County voters can only vote in their home precinct on Election Day. Residents who are not registered to vote may register and cast a ballot on Election Day thanks to same-day registration and voting. Those who wish to register on Election Day must present two qualifying forms of ID.

Ruse Burglaries Rise with Warm Weather

As the weather warms up, there tends to be an uptick in instances of ruse burglaries. Ruse burglaries are crimes in which the offender uses a “ruse” to distract their victim in order to commit a burglary. This crime is committed by offenders generally traveling in pairs. One offender uses a ruse to distract the victim, while the other offender enters the home to search for and steal cash, jewelry, and other items. Ruse burglaries occur when victims are physically present at the home and distracted.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE VILLAGE OF WHEELING DOES NOT ALLOW ANY SOLICITATION WITHIN THE VILLAGE LIMITS WITHOUT A PERMIT

Offenders use the following ruses to distract homeowners:

- Repairing fences, gutters, gas lines (other utilities), landscaping (including tree trimming)
- Blacktop/seal coating
- Water supply/water pressure
- Electrical problem outside of the house
- Paver repair
- Problems with your neighbor’s home
- Questions about property lines
- Inquiring about homes for sale in the area
- Village worker who needs to check the property or utility
- Solicitors

How to deter offenders:

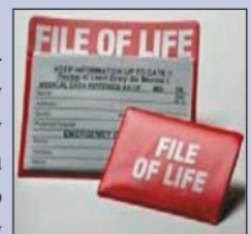
- Do not allow anyone in your home unless you know them or have a scheduled appointment.
- If a solicitor does come to your door, take notice of their vehicle (make, model, color, type, anything distinct) as well as their physical descriptors.
- If you do speak with them, keep the storm door secured, do not leave your front door unlocked/unattended, and have a phone in your hand ready to dial 911.
- Ask for an ID if they claim to be a legitimate utility or government employee.
- You can verify with the agency that sent the employee by looking up the number yourself, not the number they provide.
- Call the police if you are suspicious.

If you feel you were a victim of a ruse burglary, or if you have observed suspicious activity resembling a ruse burglary, please contact the police at 847.459.2632. If you believe a burglary is in process, call 911.



File of Life

File of Life is a simple way to communicate your important emergency medical information with life safety personnel. This is very important if you are unconscious or unable to speak to the emergency responders when they arrive. Without a list of medications, allergies, and medical history, as well as who to call, paramedics are typically forced to look for medicine bottles for answers. The paramedics then try to figure out what the problem might be based on the medicines they find. The File of Life saves valuable time in an emergency situation. The file folds in half, goes into a red plastic envelope with a magnet on the back, and is placed on the refrigerator where paramedics know to look for it. If you are interested in a File of Life, you may stop by Human Services at 1 Community Boulevard or Fire Station 24 on Milwaukee Avenue to obtain one.

What is Arbor Day?

Yard Waste Collections



Yard waste collections begin on April 1 and continue through November 30 on your regularly-scheduled collection days. Townhouses and condominiums do not have this service.

- Yard waste must be placed in paper bags or in a container clearly marked with a red X (cannot be in plastic bags or cardboard boxes). Bags and containers must not be larger than 32 gallons or exceed 50 pounds. There is no limit to the number of bags or containers.

- All yard waste must be placed at the curb by 6 a.m. the day of collection, but not before 5 p.m. the evening before.

- Brush must be bundled and tied with twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 50 pounds, exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles.

Stormwater Runoff Pollution

Stormwater runoff is generated when precipitation from rain and snowmelt flows over land or impervious surfaces and does not percolate into the ground. Stormwater runoff that flows over impervious surfaces such as streets, driveways, concrete areas, and rooftops, collects debris, chemicals, sediments, and other pollutants that enter the storm sewer system. The Village storm sewer effluent flows directly into detention basins, creeks, streams, rivers, and lakes, bypassing the partial cleaning typically performed at sanitary sewer treatment plants.



Pollutants that exist in stormwater runoff can include motor oil, antifreeze/transmission fluid, paint, solvents/degreasers, detergents, pet and yard waste, dirt and gravel, trash, pesticides, and fertilizers. Public Works personnel constantly extract some of this waste from the system for efficient flow. Residents and businesses can take measures to prevent stormwater runoff pollution from entering our storm sewer system, such as:

- Repair vehicle leaks and dispose of used auto fluids at designated drop-off facilities.
- Apply pesticides and fertilizers only as necessary; use organic mulch and reduce application of outside pest controls whenever possible.
- Compost and/or mulch yard waste, and follow local yard waste programs. Do not deposit or leave yard waste in the street.
- Remove and properly dispose of litter and debris from properties, including sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots.
- Remove and properly dispose of construction debris.
- Clean up after pets. Village Municipal Code 7.10 requires removal of pet waste on public and private property.

Storm Drain Grate/Inlet Cleaning

Storm drain grates/inlets are normally located near the edge of streets or in rear yards, collecting water which uses the storm sewer system to ultimately flow into streams, rivers, or lakes. Grates/inlets obstructed with leaves and other debris can deny constant water flow and can cause localized flooding. As snow melt occurs in spring, the Village encourages residents to safely clear storm sewer grates/inlets near their property to avoid local flooding issues. If a grate/inlet is obstructed, residents should rake the debris off the structure and onto the parkway or into a waste container. If ponding or another concern arises, contact Public Works at 847.279.6900.

Floods Are No Myth: Be Prepared for the Unexpected

Discounts on flood insurance are just one of many benefits residents enjoy as a result of Wheeling's proactive approach to flood hazard damage reduction. A 46-year member of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), Wheeling has joined a national effort to minimize property damage in cases of flooding and provide affordable flood insurance to all homeowners, whether or not they are located in or near a floodplain. As part of its NFIP commitment, the Village provides a range of information on flooding potential, prevention, safety, and other issues. Local Flood Hazard Potential

The Village's proximity to waterways such as the Des Plaines River, Buffalo Creek, and McDonald Creek raises the hazard of flooding during heavy rains. Standard homeowner's insurance does not cover flooding. Through the 1960s, private rates on flood insurance were prohibitively high, which made it almost impossible to carry flood insurance. The NFIP, formed in 1968, is designed to subsidize the cost of flood insurance to member communities, qualify them to receive disaster relief, and establish minimum national standards to reduce flood losses.

High CRS Rating

One of eight inaugural NFIP communities in Illinois, Wheeling designed programs to exceed minimum standards and optimize benefits to Village residents. In 1990, the NFIP implemented the Community Rating System (CRS) to reward communities that go above and beyond the basic requirements. Effective May 1, 2014, our rating was upgraded to Class 6, which provides a 20% discount on flood insurance policies for properties located within the special flood hazard area. Policies issued for properties outside the special flood hazard area continue to receive a 5% discount. Wheeling continues to be proactive in preventative initiatives, including:

Stream maintenance: Regular inspections of waterways to ensure they are clear of debris and potential obstructions.

Regulating new construction: New buildings in the flood zone must meet requirements for elevation and flood-proofing. Village planners ensure that new developments don't increase flood risk for neighbors in the community.

Keeping residents informed of flood risk and how to minimize impact: Our residents must be aware of the potential for flooding. Tools such as this newsletter enable us to keep residents informed regarding the risk of flooding.

Development Regulated

Development of any type within special flood hazard areas is strictly regulated. In order to construct a building or an addition, perform any grading, or fill any other type of construction in these

areas, an individual must obtain a special "floodplain development permit." This permit is issued in conjunction with other construction permits to assure that the new construction will not be susceptible to flood damage or cause increased flood damage potential to neighboring properties. Floodplain development regulations can be found on the Village's website at www.wheelingil.gov in Title 22 of the Municipal Code (a link to which can be found on the home page) or by contacting the Engineering Division at 847.279.6910.

With flooding a possibility, especially during the spring/summer season, preparation is the best defense. Safeguarding people, protecting buildings, and purchasing flood insurance are keys to defending against floods.

Protect Your Property: To flood-proof a structure, start by elevating or relocating electrical panel boxes, furnaces, water heaters, and washer/dryers to areas least likely to be flooded. Install basement floor drains and interior and exterior backwater valves. Consider erecting interior flood walls around utilities. Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors of your home. Keep materials such as sandbags, plywood, plastic sheeting, and lumber handy for emergency waterproofing. More flood protection information is available from FEMA through the "Floodplain/Flooding Information" link on the home page of our website at www.wheelingil.gov. Information is also available for review at the Indian Trails Public Library.

Personal Safety: During periods of high water, stay out of the basement where breaker boxes and electrical wiring present the risk of shock. If you know high water is imminent, shut off the electricity, gas, and water. Keep your family together and make sure everyone has identification. Move everyone—including pets—to high ground. Rescue crews cannot reach you once the water becomes two feet deep. Don't drive across flooded roads where your vehicle could stall. Flowing water above your knees can generate dangerous currents; avoid walking through it.

Village Monitors Rising Water Levels: The Village monitors rising water levels with strategically placed gauges. Comparing data with historic records, the Village can predict areas of potential flooding. In the event of a flooding situation, Village staff is mobilized to notify people in affected areas. In some situations, notification may be made by phone. Road closure information is available from radio stations.

Public Works Seasonal Positions

The Department of Public Works frequently has temporary, seasonal positions available during the summer for individuals interested

in acquiring experience in the profession. These positions perform diverse duties, with the majority of work done outdoors. Duties include assisting with streets, litter collection, parkway restorations, sign maintenance, water and sewer maintenance, facilities, light clerical, etc. as well as other work assigned. Applicants are required to be 18 years old or older, have a high school diploma or equivalent, successfully pass a mandatory medical exam including drug screening, have a valid Illinois driver's license, and be able to lift, carry, and handle objects that weigh up to 50 lbs. Annual Hydrant Flushing

Public Works will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village from May 1 through May 16, weather permitting. During this time, hydrant flushing will occur between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. and will continue until all the portions of the water distribution system are completed. Signs will be posted in affected areas of the Village while hydrant flushing is underway.

Flushing is an important preventative maintenance process and is undertaken to remove particulate matter and corrosion from the system. Residents may notice a slightly lower water pressure and discoloration of their water during this program; however, the water will be completely safe to drink. Residents are advised to check the color of the water before beginning laundry to prevent any staining.
